

The Leading Points of a Perfect Pig-Diagram with Accompanying Figure of Model Sides of Bacon-Suggestions for Breed-

ers and Consumers of Pork. Following are points of a perfect pig: 1. Neat in the head. 2. Light in the neck and shoulders. 3. Deep in the heart and around the ribs. 4. Thick in the loin 5. Stout in the thighs. 6. Short in the legs. 7. Long silky hair. This type of animal should be simed at, whether thoroughbred or halfbred or common bred pigs are kept. Large boned, coarse sows are almost invariably deficient in suckling properties and motherly in stincts generally, and from their unwieldiness they frequently overlay and crush their young. As size almost alportant that this factor should receive due consideration, and when this size is supported by only just the requisite amount of bone we have of necessity the most economical animal in every way.




Shoulder. 12. Prime streaky.

If carefully studied in connection with the figures underneath it the secompany ing diagram will explain more clearly than words the desirability of having certain parts of the hog improved and increased in weight, while the less available parts may be correspondingly r duced, and this without detriment to the constitution or fecundity of the animal. For instance, readers will know that the fore end, marked No. 17, is the lowest priced part of the side of bacon. It is therefore desirable to reduce in weight as much as possible. On the other hand the piece No. 9, the loin, is high priced. and it is important that the weight of this be increased.

It is desired to emphasize what we designated in the beginning as poin three, "deep in the heart and around the sumer's point of view, a pig which i deep in the heart and around the rib. will of necessity produce a larger quan-tity of first class bacon, viz., prime back and ribs, prime streaky. This is one o the most valuable parts of the animal and it is therefore desirable to add a much as possible to its weight. From a breeder's standpoint the pig that is deer in the heart and round or well sprung t the ribs will certainly be a good feeder because he has plenty of room for hi stomach, liver, heart and all the maiorgans. A pig that is long in the legs i nearly always flat in the ham and lack ing in plumpness. Good hair is an ind cation of strength of constitution as wel as lean meat.

Use for Broken Trowels and Weeders Knock out the old rivets. Then leve off the lower end of a small broom handl and rivet securely to plate, as shown if illustration. This makes a very usefu implement for digging out plants from the center of cold frames, hotbeds, etc. also for lifting plants anywhere in the flower garden. For many uses this wil be found much more convenient than trowel with a short handle. It will stand

FEEDING BOX FOR CATTLE.

A Virginian's Plan for Feeding Cattle and A Virginia correspondent writing to Country Gentleman gives the following Illustrated description of a feeding box for cattle. He says:



A GOOD PEEDING BOX. As I soil my cows I have been annoyed with racks and other devices where on or two master cows would keep away all the weaker once until they could fill up and walk off. From the box here illustrated four cows can feed at a time and neither reach the other, as they standat opposite corners. By laying a 15-foot pole at each corner, fastening the larger end to the top of the box, and letting the smaller end rest on the ground, a practical stall is made for each cow, restrainthe "nglies" from going around so

The boxes are 5 feet high and 6 feet square: have no bottom, and are cleaned by turning them over. The materials are scantling 2 by 4 inch and 20 feet long; for the sides, inch boards 6 inches wide and 12 feet long; and for the braces, 1; inch boards 8 inches wide and 16 feet long. These cut without waste, giving six 6 inch strips on each side. Similar boxes have been illustrated before, but this one has an improvement in the top bar which prevents the cow getting into the bex. For convenience only five side strips are shown; the number will vary with the width of lumber used or the

Potatoes and Onlone. With many crops, says The New York World, rotation seems beneficial, independent of yearly manuring, to keep up the fertility of the soil. With some, however, it does not appear to be neces-Potatoes and onions, especially the latter, do well on the same soil for years, provided they are properly fertilrized. As both are pre-eminently hood crops, the kind of cultivation they receive to make them profitable keeps the soil in the best possible condition for their growth. For the onion crop the ground should be exceedingly mellow

and rich. Barn yard and hog pen manure are both excellent for this crop, provided they are well decomposed thoroughly mixed with the soil. No crop will pay better for an uncommonly good preparation of the soil than this. A yearly top dressing of ashes applied to the onion beds and raked in before

the planting is highly recommended. For the potato the ground should be deeply plowed and well harrowed to pulverige it. The furrows for the seed bad should be deep and wide, to give the tubers room to form without obstraction from the firmer soil of their sides. For this crop the standard commercial ertilizers have given the best roturns, and are now more commonly used than for any other. They may be sown broadcast or more directly applied. For their most economical use they may either be mixed with the loose soil in the botton of the farrow before the seed is dropped or be scattered on top of a first shallo covering, leaving the furrow to be filled when the shoots begin to appear. 

The Leading Points of a Perfect Pig-Diagram with Accompanying Figure of Model Sides of Bacon - Suggestions for Breed-

Following are points of a perfect pig: 1. Neat in the head. 2. Light in the neck and shoulders. 3. Deep in the heart and around the ribs. 4. Thick in the loin 5. Stout in the thighs. 6. Short in the legs. 7. Long silky hair. This type of enimal should be simed at, whether thoroughbred or halfbred or common bred pigs are kept. Large boned, coarse sows are almost invariably deficient in suckling properties and motherly instincts generally, and from their un-wieldiness they frequently overlay and crush their young. As size almost always comes from the dam, it is very important that this factor should receive due consideration, and when this size is supported by only just the requisite amount of bone we have of necessity the most economical animal in every way.

the figures underneath it the accompany ing diagram will explain more clearly than words the desirability of having certain parts of the hog improved and ingreased in weight, while the less available parts may be correspondingly re duced, and this without detriment to the constitution or fecundity of the animal For instance, readers will know that the fore end, marked No. 17, is the lowest priced part of the side of bacon. It is therefore desirable to reduce in weigh as much as possible. On the other hand the piece No. 9, the loin, is high priced. and it is important that the weight of

It is desired to emphasize what we designated in the beginning as point three, "deep in the beart and around the ribs." Looking at this from the consumer's point of view, a pig which i deep in the heart and around the rib will of necessity produce a larger quan-tity of first class bacon, viz., prime back and ribs, prime streaky. This is one of the most valuable parts of the animal and it is therefore desirable to add a much as possible to its weight. From a breeder's standpoint the pig that is deep in the heart and round or well sprung i the ribs will certainly be a good feeder because he has plenty of room for hi stomach, liver, heart and all the mai organs. A pig that is long in the legs i searly always flat in the ham and lack ing in plumpness. Good hair is an indi cation of strength of constitution as we as lean meat.

Use for Broken Trowels and Weeders Knock out the old rivets. Then leve off the lower end of a small broom handl and rivet securely to plate, as shown i illustration. This makes a very usefu implement for digging out plants fron the center of cold frames, hotbeds, etc. also for lifting plants anywhere in the flower garden. For many uses this will be found much more convenient than trowel with a short handle. It will stand more prying.

FEEDING BOX FOR CATTLE.

A Virginian's Plan for Feeding Cattle and Restraining "Ugites." A Virginia correspondent writing to Country Gentleman gives the following illustrated description of a feeding box for cattle. He says:



A GOOD PEEDING BOX. As I soil my cows I have been an-noyed with racks and other devices where on or two master cows would keep away all the weaker ones until they could fill up and walk off. From the box here illustrated four cows can feed at a time and neither reach the other, as they stand at opposite corners. By laying a 15-foot pole at each corner, fastening the larger and to the top of the box, and letting the smaller end rest on the ground, a practi-cal stall is made for each cow, restraining the "uglies" from going around so

The boxes are 5 feet high and 6 feet square; have no bottom, and are cleaned by turning them over. The materials are scantling 2 by 4 inch and 20 feet long; for the sides, inch boards 6 inches wide and 12 feet long; and for the braces, 11 inch boards 8 inches wide and 16 feet long. These cut without waste, giving six 6 inch strips on each side. Similar boxes have been illustrated before, but this one has an improvement in the top bar which prevents the cow getting into the box. For convenience only five side strips are shown; the number will vary with the width of lumber used or the

Potatoes and Onlons. With many crops, says The New York World, rotation seems beneficial, independent of yearly manuring, to keep up the fertility of the soil. With some, however, it does not appear to be necessary. Potatoes and onions, especially the latter, do well on the same soil for years, provided they are properly fertilized. and rich. Barn yard and hog pen manure are both excellent for this crop, provided they are well decomposed thoroughly mixed with the soil. crop will pay better for an uncommonly good preparation of the soil than this. A yearly top dressing of ashes applied

the planting is highly recommended. For the potato the ground should be deeply plowed and well harrowed to pulverige it. The furrows for the seed bad should be deep and wide, to give the tubers room to form without obstraction from the firmer soil of their sides For this crop the standard commercial fertilizers have given the best roturns. and are now more commonly used that for any other. They may be sown broad east or more directly applied. For their most economical use they may either be mixed with the loose soil in the bottom of the furrow before the seed is dropped or be scattered on top of a first shall covering, leaving the furrow to be filled when the shoots begin to appear. THE "POG TYPE," BUILT FOR LAYING. A critical examination showed that nearly all that were laying were of the No. 1 type-see first cut-while those that were still unproductive resembled in shape and appearance No. 2-see second cut-which is a longer legged, un-gainly, slim bodied hen, that spends her time looking for something to get scared at. A record of the two flocks showed a difference of 20 per cent, in the number of eggs laid. 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
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
