



AMONG THE POULTRY.

Prevention and Treatment of Gapes and A correspondent writing in the New York World has the following to say:

As a means of prevention from the gapes in young chickens it is admitted that they should be kept from wet and dirty places. If they be troubled with this distemper it nearly always comes from worms in the crop and throat, as chickens, like the young of most other aniworms in the crop and throat, as chickens, like the young of most other animals, are more subject to worms than those of mature age. Onions chopped fine is a prevention, and garlic, either raw or cooked in milk, is a sure cure. The milk may be given with a spoon; also horseradish water or pellets made of the scraped or grated article, made small and crammed down their throats it they will not pick and eat it. I don't believe in fishing the worms up with a feather or crooked hair, as sometimes advised; this only gives relief, but is not a cure.






