



Secretion of Wax by Bees. In producing extracted honey with old combs, do not the bees secrete more wax than they can use with profit? In other words, is not some of the wax wasted? was a query propounded and answered recently in the American Bee Journal. Professor Cook replied: "I do not think so. I believe this waste of wax imaginary. Bees secrete wax when they need it." A. B. Mason said: "My bees do not secrete wax unless they need it. The idea that bees have to make wax, whether they want to or not, is a hum-bug. I believe." The editor said, "As bees only produce wax when needed, the chance for waste is infinitesimally small."

Keresene as a Paint. Kerosene cannot be used in place of linseed oil advantageously by mixing colors with it for painting on wood. Kerosene strikes into wood at once, and if used in that way would soon leave only a coating of dry color which would easily brush off. Kerosene is refined from the crude oil petroleum, and for preserving wood from decay or preventing the rusting of iron by covering its John Y. 


