It is a curious curcumstance that a state that has been soultra conservative as South Carolina should be the first to try the experiment of carrying on a branch of private business. It is true that she was long known as the extreme advocate of state's rights, but this referred to the relation of the state to the federal government and not to socialistic experiments. South Carolina ror many years was fast bound in the fetters of predecent and adhered with singular pertinacity to the traditions of her past. Up to the

beginning of the civil war she insisted n choosing presidential electors through her legislature, though all the other states had abandoned that system for nearly thirty years. Her laws relating to divorce furnished another instance of her unwillingness to make changes. Since the, and especially within the past few years, her people have given a very hospitable reception to new ideas, and especially to certain crade schemes of reform believed elsewhere to be absurd or impracticable, Along with these has given her appreval to a scheme to make a state monopoly of the liquor business.





A Useful Wagon Ninde Out of Dads auff Industry Small Cost.
