gold bulks now country, as well as what is held by the banks and individuals, amounts to about \$740,000,000. When I came into the Treasury Department on the 7th day of March, the amount of free gold on hand had been reduced to \$987,000, but by arrangements with Western banks it was increased until, on the 1st of April, it amounted to nearly \$8,000,000. Then heavy shipments began to be made, and two days ago we had only about \$40,000, but now it amounts to \$885,000, after deducting what has been withdrawn from the sub-Treasury to-day for shipment.

"Arrangements are now in progress by which more gold is to be procured from the West, and it is hoped that a sufficient quantity will be secured to keep the gold reserve intact. There is gold enough in the country to meet all the requirements of the situation. and if all who are really interested to maintain a sound and stable currency would assist the Secretary of the Treasury to the extent of their abilities, the existing difficulties would






