

The Condition of Crops and Live Stock

WHEAT.

The wheat crop was harves'el in ed condition, although the weather es unfavorable for the work in some calities. In quality the crop ranks one of the best grown in the state ne yield is generally satisfactory, d in many instances phonomenal. he no eage harvested, as compared its 1896, is 96 per cent, showing hat entire acresg seeded was harves ed. The estimated yield averages 12 mehels per acre. In 1896 the estima ed vield was 6 3 4 bushels.

The corn crop, though stil short of he u-ual govth at this period, has rade material improvement during he month, and now presents a cond or averaging 87, or an imp ovement five pliats during June. The mos ribus menace to the crop at present damage from chinch bags. Tais et has attacked the crop in Hopkins ald ell, Diviess and other countie Western and Southern Kentuck al e neid-ri-g the backward state he cop, the situation is somewhat

The condition of the oat crop July lst, as compared with an average year 80. On June 1 the condition was 82, and the falling off is attributed to the dry weather during the early part of June, which allowed the growth of weeds to overrun and interfere with the growth of the crop.

TOBACCO.

The condition of the tobacco crop ontinues to be discouraging, as a rule. A large majority of the reports represent the crop as backward, a poor stand, and as presenting a ragged, un the system and shock the nerves by eaven appearance. Added to these rom insects, and in Western Kentucky the crop has suffered from ex cess of moisture. Worms are abundent. Particular mention of them is made in the counties of Caldwell, Li

vingston and Ohio. The condition of the crop July 1st, as compared with average years is 68. On July 1st of last year the condition was 92. Acreage growing, as compared with acreage of 1896, is 63, which is within 1 per cent of estimate on the prospective acreage made on June 1st.

MEADOWs.

The number of acres of clover men ws cut as compared with average ears is 82. The weather was at the begin ing of the harvest season, un avorable for harvesting the crop and a considerable portion was lost or dam iged; but later the conditions were re versed and the remainder of the crup vas saved in good condition.

Tmothy meadows, the harvesting of which has not yet begun, shows a condition of 83. The quality of the crop will not be up to the standard on secount of containing weeds.

The condition of pastures is 84, onsiderable decline since June 1st. Pastures, like meadows, are weedy which greatly affect both the quantity and quality of grazing.

LIVE STOCK.

The condition of live stock contin ues good as a rule. Cholera among hogs still prevails in many counties. In McCracken county the disease is proving very fatal: Some murrain among cattle is reported in the coun-Do you know that many broad ties of Menafee and Harlan. Flies


