DRIVING SEALS.

The young male seals, which live in colonies by themselves, are the only ones permitted by law to be killed. They are driven like fl cks of sheep back to the killing grounds. The ta king of moderate numbers of these will not tend to destroy the colony as when fully grown each male seal will collect a family of perhaps forty fe-

Formerly the Alaska Commercial Co. took 100,000 skins each year, and for this privilege it paid the government \$2.50 per skin. When this con tract expired the government refused to renew it on the same terms. A new company, called the North American Commercial and Trading Company, was given the privilege of taking the seals, paying the government \$100,-000 a year, in addition to a tax of

\$9 62 on every skin taken. The colony has been so reduced in size by pelagic sealing that only some 20,000 seals are killed on the island this season. When the seals leave the islands in the fall they pass through the Aleutian Islands and go on opposite San Francisco.
