"At 1:19 be was pronounced dead, having been suspended in mid air for the short space of 12 minutes. "Upon the announcement by Drs Kussey and Wilferd that Cato was dead his corpse was taken down and

placed in a coffin. "The body was viewed by all who lesired, and then the sheriff sent the rema.ne to his mother at Chesnut Oaz church for burial.

"The condemned man was dressed in the jail for burial, and conducted to the gallows, leaving the jail at 12:40. A posse of 100 men assisted in preserving order while the officers performed their painful duty.

"The scaffold was eight feet high. ten feet square, with a trap door four feet square. The scaffold was inside of an enclosure 16 feet high and 25 feet square, The spectators entered the enclosure through a door on the ground floor, while the prisoner and officials entered through a

door on the scaffold. "While on the scaffold being prepared for the execution Cato wa cool and self-possessed, and did not chow the least emotion.
