> Washington. Jan. 18 .- Gen. Leonard Wood, Military Commander of the Department of Santiago, was before the Committee on Military Affairs today. He expressed the opinion that for some time the 7,500 men now in the province of Santiago should be continued, but that after a time 5,000 would be sufficient. He considered; however, that a military force will be necessary to the maintenance of order for some years, and it should be sufficient to quickly check any trouble. This remark applied to the island as a whole, and he thought as many as 50,000 troops should be stationed throughout Cuba. With proper precaution and tact he did not anticipate trouble, and he believed that the insurgent forces would rapidly disintregrate in all parts of the




