We would be glad that our honorable fiscal court would give this matter a careful study, and at the April term of the court see if this road could not be built. The material for construction is here in abundance and could be handled at very low figures compared to what roads at other places cost. Every dollar spent in the enterprise would be put into the pockets of our home people, outside of a few dollars for rock crushers, we repeat again that the road could be cheaply built, and we believe no investment would pay as handsome a dividend as a turnpike from Salem to Marion. 


