

DESICCATED EGGS.

Another Use for the Product of the

W. O. Stoddard, Jr., representing the Pure Food Company of Newark, N. J., called on me the other day to make some inquiries as to egg production and the location of the most important primary egg market. Mr. Stoddard is interested in a new machine for desiccating eggs, which is said to be an improvement upon the methods formely in vogue, both as to the quality of the product and the economy of desiccating. Mr. Stoddard gave me a sample of the product, which, he said, had been made about six weeks before; it is of unusually fine grain, dry, of bright attractive color and smells fresh and sweet. An omelet made from this sample had no peculiarities whatever as compared with one made from fresh eggs; the consistency is the same and the flavor all right. Mr. Stoddard claims that the product can be kept indefinitely under proper conditions, and he expects it to find general use in competition with refrigerator eggs. The desiccated article can be used for every purpose for which eggs are used except, of course, where the whole egg is necessary or where whites and yokes must be separated.-Cor. Produce Review.

Disappointing Returns. Poultry commission merchants say that one reason why a great many shippers are disappointed in the prices they receive on good poultry is that they persist in shipping stock of sizes which are not in demand. Thus enormous quantities of chicks weighing three to four pounds are sent to all the large cities, and as they are neither broilers nor roasters, are sold on the open market at the lowest prices going. Of course the shippers who know that the quality of the stock was good is dissatisfied with the returns. For the city market there is nothing between the broiler and the roaster. Cockrels not marketed at broiler size should be held for roasters. and if possible should be caponized. If this is done they can be held for a favorable market. Cockrels wnich have not been caponized must be marketed while soft, no matter how poor the prices are, for after they become hard and "staggy" they bring no more

The shape is that of the typical Leghorn; light in build but round and plump, with graceful outlines, fuil breast, wellarched neck, upright tail with flowing feathers, long sickle feathers, but close body plumage.

Progress in Breeding. A man need not be very old to re member when a 1,400 to 1,500 pound horse was a heavy draft horse, or a three-minute trotter a speedy roadster. Times have changed, however, and the heavy draft horse must weigh 300 to 500 pounds more and the roadster go a good many seconds faster to be classed as good ones of their kind. It takes a better horse to be a good one nowadays than it did ten or twenty or unirty years ago. The ideals of those days will not serve. The breed those days will not serve. The breed-er must aim to get the kind that ranks high to-day, and this is the only kind that is going to pay for his oats hereHORSES IN WINTER.

How to Keep Them Where the Cli mate is Not Too Severe

To keep idle horses or young growing colts over a year in the stable during the winter season is not only very expensive in feed and labor, but is frequently of positive injury to the horses themselves. The horse requires a great deal of exercise, and when this exercise, is not given in the way of work, they should be allowed to take it in the open fields. The cheapest and best way of caring for horses, whether idle or young, through the winter season, is to turn them out on a blue grass pasture which has not been pastured down closely in the fall. This, with a shed to run under during severe storms, a hay or straw stack, and access to salt and water, is all that this class of horses need and they thrive much better under it than if kept up in the stable. Much of the vigor and stamina of the range horses is due to their free life and abundant exercise.

We do not believe in under-feeding. Growing horses, especially, should be well fed. If not, there cannot be sufficient growth, but blue grass pasture, such as we have mentioned, gives them about as good feed in winter as they have on grass in the summer, and if there is six inches of snow on the ground, all the better, for the reason that the blue grass keeps green under the snow and horses will have no difficulty in discovering it. They will grow a long coat of hair and look shaggy and rough, but we will take our chances for a good summer's work with horses kept in this way rather than with horses that have been kept in the stable and fed, as they are al-

most certain to be, on corn. Almost equal to that method is that of allowing them the run of a field of corn stalks and adjoining it a field of second crop clover. We have tried both ways and find less difference than might be expected. Whether on blue grass or on clover, horses running at large should have a little grain in March and April for the reason that the spring rains render the pasture less nutritious. We have tried these methods for about fifteen years and know whereof we speak.

We do not recommend this method for weanling colts. They should be fed a good ration of corn and oats and allowed free access during the day time to open yards or fields. A colt stunted the first year, as many are by insufficient feed and shelter, is stunted for life, and will lose at least 100 pounds in mature weight, which is worth anywhere from ten to fifty cents a pound. There is no more shortsighted economy than that of stinting the grain feed of colts the first winter. When you are laying the foundation get it as large as you can, provided it is made of good material.-Wallace's

Brown Swiss.

Developed as a dairy breed primarily, Brown Swiss cows yield a generous flow of milk and hold out well. Good specimens may be expected to give an average of ten quarts for every day in the year. Six thousand and single instances are known of eight to ten thousand pounds. Brien-



(Swiss Cow Brienzi.) zi 168 was imported from Switzerland into Connecticut and became the most noted cow of her breed in this country. More than this she produced the largest quantity of butter fat in a day ever recorded in America at a public test. At the Chicago show (1891) her average daily record for three days was 21.7 pounds of milk, containing 3.11 pounds of fat. This was equivalent to more than 31/2 pounds of butter per day. She was then 11 years old and weighed 1,410 pounds.

FORAGE CROPS. How They Can Be Used At a Decided

Profit. All farmers on small or moderately sized holdings who keep live stock should also grow forage crops in addition to their grass pastures, since they so much reduce the area required for the latter. As a rule, the necessity for growing these crops will increase with the less favorable conditions for

growing grass pastures and vice versa. When farmers generally who live upon arable lands give that attention to the growing of this class of forage crops which they ought to, from the standpoint of self interest, no limit can be set to the possible increase in live stock and live stock products. More especially will this be true when they give that attention also to the growing of soiling and fodder which their importance demands. In those encouraging days that are drawing near, the production in these lines that will be obtained from the small areas would astonish many of the farmers of to-day. And the increase will no less apply to the quantity than to the quality of the product, because of the suitable character of the food furnished, because of its seasonableness

and because of its abundance. When nearly 100 sheep can be pas tured from the closing days of April to the opening days of Novmber on ten acres of such forage, as has been done at the Minnesota University experiment farm, the possibilities in live stock production light up with a peculiar brightness. When it is remembered that the soil was sandy, that the subsoil was sand or gravel or a mixture of the two, that the land had been but feebly fertilized, the brightness grows more radiant. And when it is called to mind that ten tons of cured fodder and ten tons of soiling food were also taken from the same ten acres during the growing period, and that much used forage was ploughed under as green manure, the firmament of possible production becomes all ablaze with promise. The first to look at those happy indications will probably be the first to engage in growing forage crops.—New England HomeTwenty Years Proof.






