

It is the custom of London dock owners to collect a tariff of 42 cents per ton on every ton of freight ports in the United States. With a view to preventing this discrimination Parliament passed a law prohibiting the charge but the dock owners got around that by having the charge stipulated in the billof-lading which, as it was negotiated on American soil, was beyond the jurisdiction of Parliament. The bill just defeat ed had for its object the prohibition of the contract on this side of the water Originally, the milling, lumber and pack ing interests supported the measure but suddenly the two latter withdrew their support and so accomplished its defeat.
