British Columbia Zinc Ores at A Grave Menace to the Home Product.

The late John W. Mackey left n estate valued at eighty million of dollars.

The St. Louis Republic of Sun day last says the Illinois Central railroad will bridge the Ohio river at Cave-in-Rock for their St Lonis Nashville line.



DOINGS OF CONCRESS.

The Venezuela Situation the Question of the Hour.

CUBAN TREATY BEFORE THE SENATE

(From our Regular Correspondent.)

Washington, Dec. 21, 1902.

ED. PRESS, Marion, Ky. For nearly a week the Venezuelan situation has occupied political attention in Washington almost to the exclusion of all else. The President and Congress are anxiously watching the Allies, although they do not believe that Great Britain will sanction any violation of the Monroe Doctrine. Secretary Hay has instructed the American Ambassadors at London and Berlin to exert their utmost efforts to bring about an arbitration, before the Hague tribunal of the difficulties which have caused Germany and Great Britian to Blockade Venezuelan ports. Meanwhile, Belgium and I taly have presented claims against the South American republic and the Allies doubtless fear that, barred from seizing territory by the Monroe Doctrine, it will be difficult for all the creditors to col lect the full amount of their claims from the bankrupt treasury of Venezuela.

It is now evident that there will be no action by Congress with reference to the South American trouble before the holday recess. The subject was brought up in the Senate on Tuesday when, in erecutive session, Senator Teller asked Senator Cullom for light on the situation. General Bliss has brought from Ha vana the completed treaty with Cubs and it has been forwarded to the Senate, as negotiated by him. There will be no consideration of the treaty, however until after the holidays, when it will be taken up by the Senate Committee on Foreign Relations. There it will meet with a serious obstacle in the long mooted question as to whether the Executive and the Senate can effect a treaty which modifies the tariff without the consent of the House. This question, which has confounded the best constitutional lawyers ever since Washington sent Jay's treaty to the Senate in 1795, has never been settled and may not be in this instance, although there are several members of the committee who desire to see it fought out and settled once and for all

Senator Morgan sprang a sensation or the Senate this week by his statement that members of the Isthmian Canal Commission still continued to draw their salaries of \$1,000 per month. Without giving the subject much thought the majority of the senators had supposed that the commission had been dischar ged when it had rendered its last report to the President, since which time it has had no duties to perform, and they were greatly surprised to learn that the con tinued existence of the commission was costing the government thousands of dollars. Senator Morgan further stated that during the past year the Commis sioners had spent but two months on the isthmus, but they had received expense funds to the amount of \$1,075,000. The Senator introduced a bill limiting the salaries of the commissioners to \$5,000 per year, allowing them actual expense and requiring that they make their head quarters on the isthmus.


