THE NEW RAILROAD.

Encouraging Talk in the Railroad Circles of Memphis.

SHORTLINE FROM NASHVILLE TO ST. LOUIS.

A special from Memphis, Tenn. to the Louisville Times, under date of July 13th, says:

"A well defined rumor is prevalent among persons of this city cognizant with railroad affairs that the Illinois Central system is about to absorb the Tennessee Central railroad.

The fact that the Illinois Central has for a long time been desirous of obtaining a line of its own to Nashville, lends color to the rumor. In addition extensive work is being done in and around Hopkinsville, Ky., and Cave-in-Rock, on the Ohio river, looking to the connection of the Hopkins ville line with another line from Hopkinsville to St. Louis.

It is understood here that the Tennessee Central will form a part of through service between Nashville and St. Louis, connecting with the Illinois Central at Hopkinsville. A branch of the Illinois Central is to be constructed from Marion, Ky., to Cave-in-

If the proposed deal goes through a line between Nashville and St. Louis that will be forty or fifty miles shorter than the present route will thus be established.





Be it enacted by the General As sembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky:

SEC. 1. In an indictment for a violation of any provision of the act approved March 19, one thousand eight hundred and ninety four, entitled, "An act whereby the sense of the people of any county, city, town, district or precinct may be taken as to whether spirituous, vinous or malt liquois shall be sold, bartered, or loaned therein," or for a violation of any act amendatory thereof, it shall not be necessary to allege that a vote was taken or an election held or any other step relative thereto but it may be simply stated that the act or acts charged were committed in a territory where the said act was in force, and in said indictment it shall be sufficient to designate said act as the local op-
