Pomona is a city of seven thousand population. It is in Los Angeles county, with two railroads, the Southern Pacific and Salt Lake, running through the center of the city. The business part is south of where the roads cross; on Second street there are three packing houses and another one now building. Some of the large houses are shipping a car of canned fruit every three hours.

The peach crop is now being worked up; everything is done by machinery except the pealing. A machine cuts the peach in halves. then the seeds are taken out and they are ready for peeling, which is mostly done by women with a corn knife. Drying is done out of doors by the heat of the sun; most all California fruits are dried by the sun. No danger of rain here as the rainy season does not commence until December. Chicago, Ill., Sept. 16 .- A new world's record for long distance running was made by a passenger train on the Baltimore & Ohio road this morning.


