

LETTER FROM COLORADO.

By permission, the PRESS publishes extracts from the following interesting letter written by Miss. Estel e Walker, formerly of Marikin, of this city:

GRAND JUNCTION, COL, July -1904 - MY DEAR SADIE: This is "'Otaz'ell": Hot, hot, hot, and more especially to me as I just returned Friday night from my first camping trip which, if you will be patient, I'll endeavor to describe.


