A CAMPAIGN LIE NAILED,

Roanoke, Va., Aug. 18 .- The following letter from Hon Henry G. Davis, the Democratic candidate for Vice President, has been made public here: Elkins, W. Va., Aug. 15, 1904-

Mr. I. V. Johnson. 
