

F. M. Baker, who some time ago purchased about 1500 acres of coal land but ween Olay and When't eroft, extensing on both sides of the I. O. R. R. for about two miles has just sompleted the sinking of his shaft, it being about 225 feet deep. He passed through two veins of ount, one being Nos 11 and 12 at 85 feet, and being over 7 feet thick; the coal taken from this vein being of a very fine qual ity. The other vein was passed through at a depth of about 210 feet, this being the standard No 9 coal. No. 9 coal is considered the best coal in Western Kentucky.

We understand that Mr. Baker contemplates beginning at once to drive entries preparatory to working the No 9 vein on a large scale, placing nearly a mile of side track with a capacity of something like 15 to 20 cars per day:

This is considered about the finest coal field in the country and account of the two fine veins of coal, the large body of coal land, all being thrown together in a square, and he having sunk his shaft at about the deepest point, throwing nearly the whole coal tield so that it can be worked up the dip, thus being able to keep the water out of the miners way. and to haul the loaded cars down grade, thus saving a big expense in handling, etc .- Dixon Jour-






