

### BUSINESS OUTLOOK

Renewed confidence in the business situation is believed to be on the increase, but it is not entirely of the over sanguine variety, which is satisfied with theories. rather than facts. Ontside of dis tinotly financial and speculative circles, a conservative attitude is still maintained in trade quarters, but sentiment is inclined to take a hopeful view of the future Despite reports of frost damage o corn, and a shortage of the wheat crop compared with that of last year, harvest prospects give assurance that the final outcome will result in great increment to the country's wealth. The volume of business shows an increase, and manufacturers are preparing for prosperous general conditions.






