Especially is it probable that such a question would be asked. when it is considered that nowhere in America have ores similar to these been previously exploited. Another difference and a very favorable one it is, lays in the fact that 75 per ct. of the product put through the mill is a salable product, while in most other districts 8 per cent would be regarded very good. And it is for this reason that the tailings elevator of the ordinary mill would be as useless to mills of this district as an astrophied limb to man.

It has been argued that the small difference in specific gravity between zinc sulphide and fluor spar about .92 is an almost insurmountable difficulty. Yet but a few years since it was similarly argured that barite, which differs but 40 from zine sulplide, was inseperable from it. Now it is seperated by at least two different methods, that of decrepitatio and by the electrostatic seperator.

We will now consider as briefly be a success. as possible the various methods so far pursued in the district. The problem divides itself readily into two parts. In the first fluorspar is associated with zinc ores, together with some galens, and is to be sep to erated from them to make a marketable zinc, a lead, and in some cases, also a fluorspar product. Here the ores contain zine sulphide, some calcite and limestone, and a small per cent of fluorspar. The problem is to save the lead and zine, and this, as I have already said, is readily done.

The new Evening Star Mill, re-

cently erected by the Egle Fluornew year, is to make a dry concen tration. It is built on the same principle as the mill that preceded it at the same mine, being built however on a much larger scale, containing also more improved muchinery, and will have as well the largest power plant in the district. Its object is to seperate ores containing fluorspar, lead and zinc as well as calcite, and will oe especially adapted to handle ores of a fine grade texture such as are com mon in this district, and where the minerals are minutely intergrown with each other. The ores here are to be very finely crushed by breakers and rolls, to be very completely sized by a system of revolving screens to a very fine mesh, and will then be treated on Hooper Pneumatic tables, which are a form of air jig. The small mill it takes the place of did some splendid work, making the most complete seperation of the ores yet made in the district, so that there is every indication that the new mill, improved as it is, will

The fact that dry seperation is usually attended with higher oosts both first cost of plant and cost of operation, has led some to think that this would act as a drawback t commercial end of the scheme To this we may answer. that first, the high per ct of concentrates, 75 per ct. per ton or more per ton of ore, would really permit of a greater milling cost. than low grade ores. Secondly. the very large scale upon which the mill is to be operated, has a tendency to reduce the average cost per ton, very effectually. So







The grinding of the fluorspar, notably at the Kentucky Mill, represents the final stage of the process of raising the market value of the fluorspar, This portion of the plant may be installed at a comparatively small extra cost and consists principally of a drier for drying the usual mill product, then either buhr, ball or Griffin mills for pulverizing it and a bolting machine for sizing, The cost of grinding per ton is very small, but the grinding adds rather largely to the profits.
