The analysis shows their is no fluor spar below one hundred feet on the Columbia vein, and the Blue & Nunn Nine Acres on the *Columbia vein is also free from fluor spar, and the Columbia Mining Company are milling a high grade ore for them from that mine with the common Joplin jigs and Allis chamber tables.

The separation of the mineral that is being mined by the Commodore Mining Company will also be a very easy problem, as so far as they have gone down they have nothing but lead and spar. This can be separated easily with the common Joplin jigs. And it is anticipated by most expert miners there will be no fluor spar in this mine below seventy five or one hundred feet. However there may be a mixture of lead, zine and fluor spar from 60 to 75 feet. As zinc will be more than apt to show itself at 60 feet or at a less depth, and fluor spar will begin to diminish as soon as zinc puts in its appearance, and at the depth stated above there will be no fluor spar as is the case in the old LaRue shaft at ninefy two feet on the same vein.



it is now clear and pleasant south of the wind breaks, and the sun is thawing the snow away; it will not be long going and when it is gone one of the beauties of this coun try is we will have no mud to stick to the bottom of the shoe except a little which will soon dry and be nice again.

We have fine roads the year round; fifty bushes of wheat is a moderate load for two mules or horses over any of the smoothest country. I thought when I purchased my three and one-fourth inch wagon that my team looked too light for it but I find that it is plenty light for them. We load according to the length of trip we are going to make, and if it is going to be very long and we are in a hurry, we put on a third and sometimes the fourth, all abreast, and if we meet a traction engine pulling a separator or even a house we pass each other all right.

I se a house upon it wheels as I write. It has two engines to it; it is the store and post office of Hills dale, a considerable house, being pulled two and a half miles to a new town on a new railroad called the Denver, Enid and Gulf.

I am fourteen miles south and west of Pond Creek, the county seat, and don't touch my wagon brake going to or coming from town. West of me it is four miles to the hills and canous. The hills weeds as corn. are not so high but crossing the canons makes some very steep pla ces in the road.

This is a very fine soil west of these hills, and eighteen miles from here is the salt plains. This was reserved by the Government for the salt. Seven miles west of the plains is Cherokee, a thriving and beautiful little town, on the Orient R, R. and in a beautiful country.

Six miles South of me is a little string of hills about two miles long, running east and west, then strikes off level, a high and very fine country.

This country is well settled up and with people from almost every State, and they seem to be a fairly good and civilized people, yet are not much christianized. It is eas ier to get company to a show or to a public sale than to church. The churches are sprinkled all over the country: four are in sight of me; almost every denomination is represented here.

There is lots of cottonwoods in the lowlands over a foot through. The mulberry is adwarf with a thick, bushy top, mostly used for windbreaks about orchards and buildings; it is also used with catalpa and locusts for posts, and bears lots of fruit.


