Instructions to Voters!

Adopted by the Crittenden County Republican Committee for Primary April 1st.

FIRST. That all voters who are known and recognized as Republicans, or who voted for Roosevelt and Fairbanks at the November, 1904, election, and all young men arriving at the age of 21 years between the election of November 1904 and of November 1905, and who announce their intention of supporting the principles and candidates of the Republican Party, and all other voters who agree to support the nominees of said Primary, except known and recognized Democrats, shall be entitled to vote in this Primary.

SECOND. That, if any one who is entitled to vote in this Primary announces under oath that he is unable to read, or by reason of defective eyesight or other physical disability, is unable to make the stencil mark it shall be the duty of the Clerk of the Election to ask him whom he desires to vote for in the list of candidates for each office, and to mark his ballot in the presence of all the officers, in accordance with the statement of the voter, and it shall be deposited by the Judge.

THIRD. Any vote which is challenged, and upon the legality of which the officers of the Primary cannot agree, the ballot shall be marked as "challenged" and returned to the County Committee.

FOURTH. Voter will obtain his ballot from the Clerk of Election who shall sign his name as Clerk on the back thereof and the ballot shall be taken by the voter to the booth and he shall make a stencil mark in the square at the right hand end of the name of each candidate for whom he desires to vote and he shall then fold the ballot and deliver it to one of the Judges of the Election by whom it shall be deposited in the ballot box.

If the voter spoils or mutilates a ballot he is entitled to receive one more only from the Clerk of the Election.



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

Ode Fryer, formerly of Living ton county, and who married laughter of T. R. Curry, also that county a few years ago, was tilled at Anniston, Mo., where they had been residing for several months.

Wireless Method.

Very great importance is attached to the recent discovery that any ordinary healthy tree may be successfully pressed into service, in place of a tower with its antennae of wires for the purpose of transmitting messages by the wireless method, which was made by Major Squire, of the United States Signal Service Corps.
