Louisville, Ky., June 10 .- One of the most pathetic events ever known in Louisville was the marriage yesterday of Mr. Robert Horner and Miss Elizabeth Burnett, daughter of Judge Henry Burnett, formerly of Paducah. The ceremony took place at noon at Norton infirmary, where Mr. Horner lay on his death bed. At 5 o'clock he passed away. His bride sat at his bed side clasping his hand until the end

Mr. Horner was 29 years-old. He was the son of Samuel Horner, of Philadelphia, a millionaire, and had charge of the Kosmos Portland Cement works in Louisville, owned by his father. His wedding to Miss Burnett was announced for Tuesday. Many festivities had been planned.

A week ago Mr. Horner developed a carbuncle on his neck. He paid little attention to it until three days ago, when he went to the Norton infirmary to have it treated. Blood poisoning developed yesterday moru-



### Obituary.

The subject of this sketch, Mrs. Eliza Brown, was born in Livingston county, now Crittenden, the 5, day of June 1826 and died May 22, 1907. She was 80 years, 11 months and 17 days old. Her maider name was O'Neal. She was married to J. C. Brown July 27, 1848, She professed faith in Christ about 28 years ago and some time thereafter, united with the Camp Creek Missionary Baptist church, but at the time of her death was a member of Baker

Creek church. Aunt Liza, as she was familiary called, was a good woman. She was very industrious and a great helpmeat to her husband. She was a devoted christian. The writer well remembers when he was a young preacher, and her pastor, that Aunt Liza would sometimes get happy while he was preaching and shout the praises of God. 




