#### TO BUILD NEW RAILROAD

Length Through Rich Country.

Wickliffe, Ky., July 6 .-- Work on the first section of a new line of road Had it succeeded in crossing the from Wickliffe, Ky., to Bristol,

The total distance of the entire From Wickliffe the road will cross the southern border of Kentucky to Jellico, and thence through the northern part of Tennessee to Bristol Among the places to be touched will be Jacksboro, Tazewell, Sneedsville, Rogersville, Blouncville, and Bristol, Tenn., and Mayfield, Dexter, Canton, Cadiz, Gracey, Hopkinsville, Elkton, Scottsville, Franklin, Tompkinsville, Albany, Monticello and Jellico in Kentucky.

Such a line will materially shorten the distance from the coal and iron fields of Western Kentucky to Cairo, Chicago and the West.

Surveyors are being pushed on the remainder of the route. The line will cross the Tennessee river twice, one of the bridges being about 1,800 feet long, and will cross the Cumberland over a high bridge of 1,000 about one-half of 1 per cent., and The officers are: President, L. Death Angel Visits Neighbor County and Takes away Old Landmark—Also Temperance Speaker

Los Angeles, Cal., July I-Francis Murphy, the temperance lecturer, died at 10:30 a. m. yesturday.

Francis Murphy first came into prominence as a temperance advocate in this city in 1876. Under his leadership a blue ribbon propaganda resulted in thousands of men singing the "Murphy pledge" and attracting national attention. Fifteen meetings were held in Library hall following which a call for funds was made to carry on the campaign in other cities.

#### Sigantic Enterprise.

New York city began work on one of the most gigantic enterprises of modern times. The work is to supply the great city with water from the valleys of the Catskill, 130 miles away. When completed it will deliver in New York 600,000,000 gallons of water daily.

Some of its features are gigantic. The Ashokan reservoir will be twelve miles long, one and one-half miles in breadth with a storage capacity of 120,000,000,000 gallons. The most remarkable feature will be the immense inverted siphon which will dip 650 feet at Storm Kint mountain under the Hudson and come up on the other bank. The aqueduct will be of about the dimensions of a railway tunnel. The work is expected to cost \$160,000,000, or more than the first estimates for the Panama

The projectors have not the slightest doubt of its entire practicability. and have moreover a good deal of pride in the work, because when completed there will be nothing in the old world to compare with it either in magnitude or splendor.





An Editor's Tip. A wife who loves her husband will



#### Growth of Turbine Business.

During the fiscal year which ended Jan. 31, 1907, the General Electric Company sold 283 turbines, with an watts, or about 969 kilowatts per unit. The General Electric Company has now received orders for or installed a total of over 850 Curtis steam turbines, with a total capacity of 799,000 kilowatts.

The number of turbines ordered in the last fiscal year was slightly less than in the year before, but the size of the turbine was larger, so that the total kilowatt capacity is more than 50,000 kilowatts greater than in 1905-06.


