# AT CHURCHILL DOWNS

Historic Race Course at Louisville wil be Location of 1907 Exhibitions.

After three weeks of negotiations with the owners of Douglas Park at Louisville, resulting in a failure to induce them to lease the grounds for the 1907 Kentucky State Fair, pending the clearing of the title to the property and adjustment of other matters in connection with the purchase of the track and buildings as a permanent location, the Kentucky State Board of Agriculture has been given the use of Churchill Downs at Louisville for holding this year's exhibition during the week of of Sept. 16. The Kentucky State Fair will therefore be held on the dates mentioned, at historic Churchill Downs, where the Fair last year was held.

Messrs. Charles F. Grainger and Matt J. Winn, representing the Churchill Downs interests, have agreed to the use of these grounds and the committee representing the State Board have extended to them a vote of cordfal thanks for their liberality in the matter, inasmuch as much as the grounds are tendered to the State Fair upon terms agreeable to the State Fair management.

Churchill Downs, while a typical race course, is considered to be the best equipped State Fair grounds in south, with the possible exception of the Texas Fair grounds. There will be an abundance of stall room for all kinds of live stock, there is a big grand stand and there are buildings suitable for the departments which must be shown indoors.

The entry list in the different ex hibit departments is the greatest in the history of the Kentucky State Fair, at this time, three weeks prior to the exhibition.

The State Fair management spending over \$7,000.00 in exploitation and expects record breaking attendance daily. Some of the greatest amusement enterprises in the country have been contracted with for State Fair week.



Cow Swallows Watch 6 Years ago.

Lexington, Ky., Aug. 23,-Dr. D. D. Bell, one of the best known veterinarians in this city, has been called in to vouch for the finding of a gold watch in the lung of a cow a short time ago, by F. Dryden, butcher, and also appointed referee in a controversy over the claim to the watch made by the original owner, Israel Rudge.

Dr. Bell says that in the spring of 1901 Mr. Rudge was at work in his barnyard when a calf got hold of his waistcoat and chewed it up. He could not find his gold watch, but when he sold the cow a few months ago to Mr. Dyren he said he believed the animal had swallowed his gold watch six years before and jokingly told the butcher to look out for it.

Mr. Dryden found the watch in the left lung of the cow. He says the watch was running and recorded the correct time within ten minutes.

Dr. Bell says the only way he can account for the watch running is that the breathing of the animal kept it wound up, owing to the position it occupied in the lung. He holds that the watch belongs to the butcher .-
