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

IMPROVING TAX LAWS.

Taxation is the subject of investigation and discussion in many states and three reports have been made by special commissions which give an interesting indication of the present trend of expert opinion.

New York's commission recommends the abolition of the tax on personal property and the imposition of a progressive tax on inheritances. The California commission is also opposed to taxing personal property, but asserts that if it is to be taxed the revenue should go to the counties exclusively with the revenue from the tax on realty. It is further recommended that all corporations and franchise taxes be reserved to the





This will give you a complete sample, should some of the ears be injured in transit or become moldy. Remember that each exhibit ear must be practically perfect. The kernels must all be in place, and the ear must show no

injury in any part. Be very careful to label each package with your entry card, previously secured from the management of the nell, the inventor of the formidable Exposition. This gives the correct address and also contains the number of your entry. This is the only way n which the management can keep a complete record and give you due credit for your exhibit.
