James Herron Indicted for Man Slaugh ter--Released on \$2,500 Bond. Returned to His Home In Illinois.

#### "ALLEGED NIGHT RIDER" CASES CONTIN-UED UNTIL JUNE TERM OF COURT.

Ernest Slayden on Trial for the Murder of J. W. Sullenger -Full Synopsis of Case Will Apear In Next Issue of the Record-Press.

James Herron who surrendered to the authorities after the killing of Fred Daughtery and who was carried to the Henderson jail for safe keeping, where he has since been confined, was brought here Tuesday on the 11 o'clock train following the finding of an indictment, by the grand jury now sitting, for man slaughter, the penalty for which is two to twenty-one years in the penitentiary at the discretion of the jury. He was accompanied by his brothers several friends and went direct the Court house from the train.

Judge Gordon fixed his bond at \$2500.00 and it was immediately filled being signed by several prominent citizens, after which he was released from custody and accompanied by his brothers and several friends went the New Crittenden Hotel for dinner and in the afternoon went to Cave-in-Rock, Ill., the home of the family.

"The night rider" cases which were set for trial last Friday, were all postponed until next court excepting four cases which were on docket to succeed the Sullenger murder case which has been engaging the court's attention the whole State Union meeting at Madisonville, and was deeply impressed with the week. The defendants are Alonzo Gray. Tom Jones, O. C. Peek and Boone strength and sincerety of the man. We must have him here in Henderson at an Bush, and they were all here ready for trial, we are informed, excepting Alonzo Gray who is sick and unable to appear. Judge Gordon took this case under advisement Wednesday morning and on account of the illness of one defendant and one of the attorneys in the case, granted a continuance until the June term for the four named defendants. Ernest Slayden, who has been confined in the Henderson jail for safe keeping since the November term of Circuit Court was returned here for trial last Monday afternoon. He stands indicted for willfull murder, the penalty for which if convicted is life imprisonment or death. If neither of these penalties is inflicted he could be cleared or the jury may disagree. The regular panel was quicky exhausted and only two jurors obtained: When the case was called Thursday morning Judge Gordon ordered a venire of one hundred men summoned frem the extreme eastern section of the county. This number was exhausted by two o'clock Friday afternoon and only five men were left in box. At that time Judge Gordon ordered another seventyfive, instructing the sheriff to have special regard for the fact that jurors would be difficult to secure in the county of Crittenden. The last ten men placed in the jury box from the second venire were sufficient to fill the panel, more on account of the fact that the Commonwealth and the defense had exhausted their challenges, than to the fact that either side was satisfied with all the men in the box, it is said five days have been consumed by the commonwealth in examining its witnesses-sixty in number. The defendant, pale and thin from long confinement was placed on the stand Tuesday afternoon to testify in his own behalf, and there are probably twenty more witnesses for the defence, and the entire week will no doubt be taken up in examining witnesses and in speeches. This is one of the most noted murder trials on record and is attracting wide spread interest. The court room is crowded at each sitting of the court even standing room being at a premium. The defendant is constantly attended by his wife, who by her youth and beauty has enlisted much sympathy, and also by his mother. He is represented by Hon. L. H. James and Mayor John W. Blue The murdered man belonged to one of the county's best known families and has a large circle of relatives. Hon. John L Grayot has besides, County Attorney Henderson, the Hon. A. C. Moore to assist in the prosecution, and the speeches on both sides it is predicted will be record breakers in Crittenden county criminology. We will publish next week a full page synopsis of the Sullenger murder and the trial. On account of its volume we could not get it condensed and ready for this week's paper. ## TOBACCO GROWERS MEET---JUDGE GOR-DON'S ADDRESS ADVISED ORGANIZATION

The Tobacco Growers, of Crittenden county, met in Marion Saturday, pursuant to call of County Chairman W. B. Rankin, of the Stemming District Association.

He called the meeting to order in the opera house at 1:30 p. m.

Judge J. F. Gordon was the first speaker and he concentrated into his thirty minutes talk many excellent ideas and much splendid advice to the farmers. He advised them to hold on to their organization, and that to give them up now, meant to set back the hands on the diol of their prosperity for many years. He said the Stemming District Association had done much good for the toba raisers of this district. He urged his hearers to hold its reputation for law and order forever as unsulled as in the past. He said that lawlessness could not be tolerated and would injure the cause of any one using it to coerce others into their way of thinking or acting. He advised persuation to obtain the co-operation of your neighbor; but never violence. He said to obtain suc cess farmers' organization must stick strictly to business; keep out of politics, and be of a law abiding and peaceful citizenship.

His speech was much appreciated as shown by the frequent applause. General Manager Wm. Elliott was the next speaker. He is a business man and makes a business like speech. He reviewed the situation as seen from the standpoint of general manager and urged the farmers to stand by him and the executive committee in the management of the officers of the Association. daughter did not even shed tears. As s on as the verdict was announced, the attorneys for the defense claimed that the verdict of vesterday which cleared Sharp, definitely reported disagreement as to the Coopers, and on the ground that the jury said it was hopelessly hung, asked for a new trial. The Coopers were admitted to \$25,000 bail, each, pending Judge Hart's decision. In the event ha overrules the motion, an appeal will be taken. The verdict was returned at 9:45 this morning.

## HAVE A SECOND PITTSBURG **RIGHT HERE AND DON'T KNOW IT,**

"You people in Western Kentucky don't realize what is ahead of you in the coal line," said C. F. Roetzel, of Boonville, Indiana, Thursday,

"You have a second Pittsburg right here and don't seem to know it. I firmly believe that this part of Kentucky will, within a few years, duplicate the story of the Pittsburg and the Pennsylvania coal fields.

"The Western Kentucky Coal Company seems to be 'wise' to the possibilities. It is marvelous the scope of their plans and their boldness in equipping for the development of their properties. It is my belief that they are going after some of the Government's business, such as the Panama coal contracts."

Mr. Roetzel has dropped into Henderson for a business call and a social chat with his old-time friend and business partner, Albert Lieber. He recently turned his attention to the manufacturer of mining machinery and has patented an automatic hoisting cage and improved mine track switch.

His hoisting cage is being recommended by the State mine inspector of Indiana and is taking well. It is self-dumping, self-centering, self-releasing, and in fact does everything automatically except to go into the rooms and dig coal

It was suggested to Mr. Roetzel that it would be a good thing for him to move his plant to Henderson to be in the center of the coal activity. #### NEATH IN THE SEA---GALIFORNIA AERONAUT FALLS FOUR THOUSAND FEET INTO PACIFIC OCEAN.

San Pedro, Cal., March 9, - While hundreds watch his frantic efforts to control a great balloon which was swiftly bearing him out over the pacific ocean yesterday afternoon, Lester Elkins, an amateur aeronaut, twenty years old soared 4,000 feet into the air before he cut loose his parachute and dropped into the waters of the outer harbor to his death.

As the stiff wind carried him out to sea, boatmen hastily left the inner harbor in launches to rescue him, but owing to the high wind their efforts were useless

As the huge bag arose it careened and was carried rapidly out over the water. Elkins tried desperately to guide it back to the land from swinging from the bar below, but soon the balloon was far out to sea. The parachute filled after he had fallen a short distance, but was caught by the wind and carried still further out and fell in the oce an a mile beyond Dead Man's Island.

Elkins came to California a few months ago from San Antonio, Tex., where his mother now lives. His body has not been recoved.

Long Branch, Cal., March 9. - Five thousand people saw John Savage, an amateur areronaut, ascend from the beach in a fierce wind which at times threatened careen the balloon, and they watched him as he drifted over the ocean- He did not cut loose until he was 2,000 feet high.
