OWNERS OF BANK STOCK HARD HIT

Owensboro Men Must Give Up Homes to Satisfy Creditors Claims.

Owensboro, Ky., Sept. 15. - Ac cording to a decision handed down by Supreme Juge Walter Evans, the stockholders of the bankrupt Owensboro Bank & Trust Company will have to put up twice the amount of their capital stock and reimburse depositors in full. The capital stock was \$1,000,000 and was squandered by James Parish, the bank president. The stockholders will many, of them be bankrupted by the decision of the court, which is based on a Kentucky statute making stockholders liable for twice the par value of their stock. Among the hardest hit of the stockholders will be E. Rice, the wealthy tobacco manufacturer, of Louisville. He will have to produce about \$100,000. Large blocks of the stock were held locally. HALEY'S COMET

Sighted and Will be Here on Time.

Cambridge, Mass., Sept 14. - Halley's comet, traditional since 250 years before the Christin era as the forerunner of evil times for the lower Louis or Washington classes, has been sighted again after seventy-four years, absence from the immediate ken of astronomers.

> A dispatch received Sunday at Harvard university observatory from Prof. Wolff of Heidelburg, bearing the news that he discovered the comet Saturday-5,642 in right ascension, six hours, eighteen minutes, twelve seconds; declination seventeen degrees, eleven minutes north.

That is the farthest date to which the patient labors of the astronomers have carried it back, and it was then seen and noted by the Chinese astronomers, who saw it again in the August of B. C. 87.
