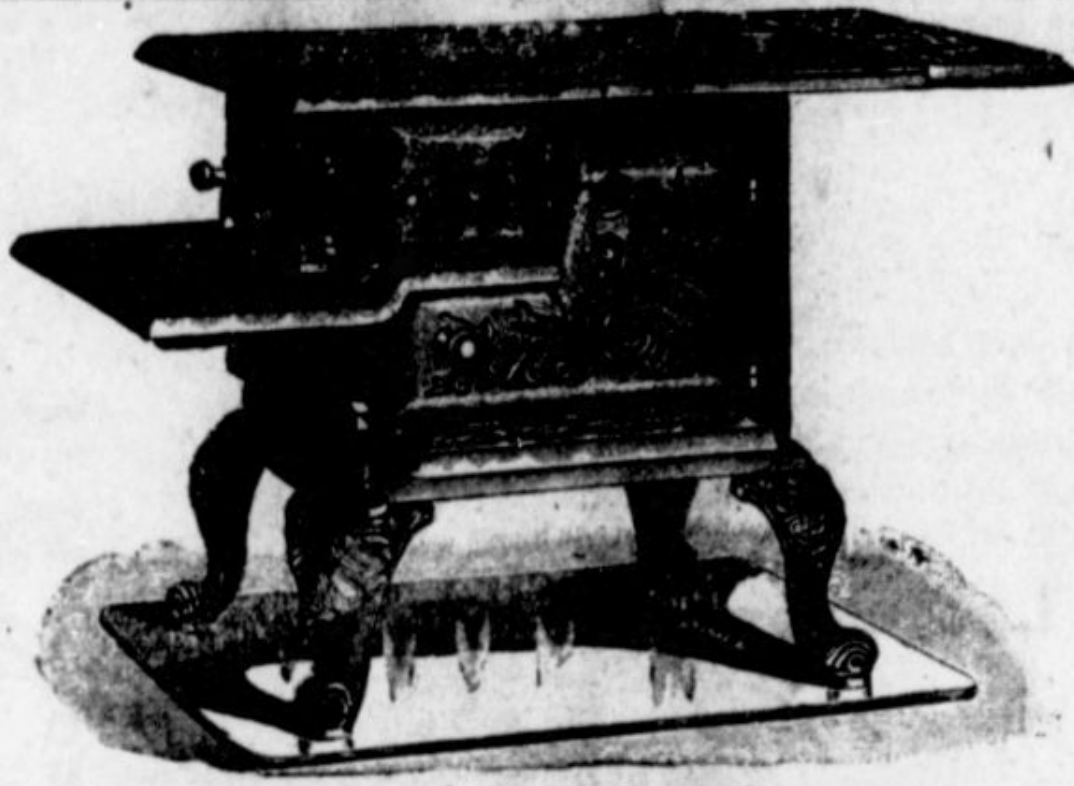

UNITED STATES CIRCUIT COURT.

Sale of Kentucky and Indiana Telephone and Telegraph Company

United States Circuit Court, Western District of Kentucky, at Louisville, J. D. Powers, Receiver, Complainant, vs. Kentucky & Indiana Telephone & Telegraph Company, et al, Defendants.

Pursuant to the requirements of final decree, entered in the above entitled cause on January 7, 1910, and signed as Special Master, appointed by said decree, will on the 11th day of March 1910, at the hour of 11 o'clock a. m., at the front of the city limits of Owensboro, Ky., sell as a whole at public auction, to the highest bidder, all of the properties, rights, privileges, franchises and immunities of every character and description whether real, personal or mixed, whether in possession or in action and whosoever situated, of the Kentucky & Indiana Telephone & Telegraph company, including the following to wit:

The telephone exchange and all poles, wires, conduits and other appliances constituting the telephone system of said Kentucky & Indiana Telephone & Telegraph company in the city of Owensboro, Kentucky, and the franchise granted to said company by the city of Owensboro. Also a telephone line running beyond the city limits of Owensboro in the West Main street and River roads for a distance of about four miles.

Also a telephone pole line from Owensboro to the city limits of Henderson, a distance of 32 3/4 miles, in which, in addition to the Henderson line, is a line, 14 miles long to Cordsville, Kentucky.

Also a telephone line running four and a half miles beyond the limits of the city of Owensboro on the Leitch-

field road.

Also 30 shares of stock in the Rural Home Telephone company, consisting partly of preferred and partly of common stock.

The said sale will include and will pass to the purchaser everything of value belonging to the Kentucky & Indiana Telephone & Telegraph company, including all accounts owing to, but not collected by, the receiver, at the time of his transfer to the purchaser. But any surplus cash then in the receivers hands, over and above the amount necessary to pay all of his liabilities, shall be subject to the right of the courts to determine as to the disposition thereof.

In the event the funds in the hands of the receiver, at the time such transfer, shall not be sufficient to pay and satisfy all of the liabilities incurred by the receiver, the purchaser shall assume and pay, or otherwise satisfy, said liabilities as part of his purchase price; and such excess liability may, by order of the court herein, be charged and fixed as a lien on the premises in the hands of the purchaser.

Everything ordered to be sold will be as an entirety. No bid will be received from any one who shall not first deposit with the undersigned as special master, as a pledge that the bidder will make good his bid in case of its acceptance, \$50,000 in money, or certified check or certificate of deposit for that amount. The amount of cash, certified check or certificates of deposit so deposited by any unsuccessful bidders, will be returned to him, or them, when the property is struck off.

In case a bid shall be accepted and the sale confirmed by the court, and the successful bidder shall comply with the terms thereof, the sum deposited by him at the time of sale shall be credited as a part payment of the purchase price.

In the event any bidder whose bid has been accepted shall fail to comply with any order of the court in regard to the payment of the purchase price, the cash deposited by

him shall be retained as liquidated damages and shall be applied to wards the expense of any re-sale which may be ordered, or towards making good, any deficiency, or loss in case the property at a re-sale shall bring less than at the former sale. But if a bid be accepted and sale thus made by the special master, and the court shall refuse to confirm the same, then the deposit made by the bidder shall be returned to him.

The balance of the purchase money exclusive of the deposit required as aforesaid, may be paid in cash, or the purchaser may satisfy and make good said balance in whole or in part by surrendering outstanding bonds and overdue coupons attached to, or cut from, said bonds of the Kentucky & Indiana Telephone & Telegraph company in the manner provided in said decree.

The purchaser will be required to pay the balance of his purchase price within thirty days after the entry of an order requiring such payment, and the court to reserve the right to re-sell said property in case of his failure so to do.

Reference is hereby made to the decree in the above entitled cause for greater certainty.

HON. MARION F. POGUE'S REGULAR LETTER

He Says That While There is Not Much Doing Now, Something Will Be Pretty Soon.

His High Tribute to Gov. Goebel.

Frankfort, Ky., Feb. 7, 1910
Dear Record-Press:—

This has been an eventful week in the capital city. While much has not been accomplished in the line of law making time has been killed in the most barabasic fashion.

The House has listened to such notables as Dr. McCormack, Gov. Wilson and ex-senator McCary.

Dr. McCormack made a great talk on public health. It was comprehensive and practical. He told the members the value of good health, how to be healthy and their duty to provide for the preservation of the public health, especially the stamping out of tuberculosis and typhoid fever. He is one of the greatest men of the times, brainy, big hearted and having the courage of his conviction, devoting his life to the healing of the nation, his voice having been heard in every state in the Union and most every capital in Europe in the crusade against disease and untimely death.

Gov. Wilson sent in another lengthy message Tuesday. He asked for \$400,000 to complete the new capital. It was news to most of the members as we thought it was already complete, but we are told that about \$150,000 must yet be paid for pictures, and panels to be painted on the walls. But it took our committee on State capital only a few moments to scale the Governors half million request down to \$50,000 to finish the grading of the grounds and the distribution of water about the grounds. Pictures and bond issue don't sound well in the same paragraph.

The funeral of Arthur Goebel and the unveiling of the statue of William Goebel brought many people to the capital. The weather being inclement, the exercises at the cemetery were brief, the floral offerings were profuse.

The statue is of bronze being a good likeness of the dead governor. It surmounts a beautiful granite pedestal standing upon the hill overlooking the city where he was wont to stand in life and gaze upon the city he had learned to love. The people of Frankfort and Franklin county still love the memory of Wm Goebel. They knew him well, they saw him day after day, month after month and year after year as he battled for their rights in the old State house. They saw him fall at its very portals, his life ebbing forth in a crimson stream, a sacrifice for a duty so nobly done, they saw him carried to his grave on the hill and laid to rest, to sleep as the martyr sleeps. After ten years of trust and corporate greed running riot in and about the very House and Senate chambers of our State capital and the lobbyists growing more desperate every session in their effort to bind and gag the masses, the life work of Wm. Goebel stands out in bold relief on the horizon of Kentucky's fast decaying statesmanship.

We need more men of ability and courage who will not sell their honor for a mess of pottage, and if need be die for the right. Mr. Goebel had his faults and ambitions, it is true, but if our Legislation only had a few Goebels among them, the filibustering would stop, the atmosphere clear up and lobbyists would break for tall timber at once, and soon the common people could tell where they come in. The memorial exercises were held at the Opera House and Senator McCravy in an eloquent address paid beautiful tribute to the memory of Mr. Goebel.

Justus Goebel followed in a short but vigorous address in which he thanked the thousand Kentuckians

for the kindness in erecting the monument to his brother. He then in the bitterest terms arraigned the slayers of his brother, and the Governor for the pardon of those charged with the crime.

The different committees are visiting the institutions of the state this week which leave us with barely a quorum, but next week we will begin with two or three sessions per day, and things will begin to hum, unless the county unit Bill gets cross wise in the hopper again and chokes the mill. It came up last week in the senate and was given another hypodermic from which it will slumber until we send the Waggoner Bill over from the House to engage their attention. For particulars see Senate Journal.

Both houses have passed the resolution asking for adoption of the Income Tax feature to be known as the sixteenth amendment to constitution of the United States.

Whereas, H. J. M. and others, filed with the Clerk of this court, and in open Court on the 8th day of November, 1909, a petition signed by more than Ten of the legal white voters of Tolu Common School District, No. 10, for white children in Crittenden County; which petition was indorsed by a majority of the Trustees of said District, and by the Superintendent of Common Schools for said County; and said petitioners being tax payers in said Common School District, praying the Judge of the Crittenden County Court, to have an order made on his order book, ordering the Sheriff, whose duty it is to hold Elections, to open a poll, or cause it to be done, at the next regular State, Town or City election, to be held therein, or any other day fixed by the Judge of said Court in the order, for the purpose of taking the sense of the legal white voters in said School District upon the proposition as to whether a Graded Common School shall be established and maintained by the Levy and collection for that purpose of a Tax of 50 cents on each One Hundred Dollars worth of property in said District owned by white persons and by corporations; and a Poll Tax of \$1.50, on each white inhabitant therein over twenty one years of age, for the purpose of maintaining a Graded Common School for white children in said District, and for the erection and repairing of suitable buildings thereof.

Said District to be bounded as follows, viz: Beginning at the Wallace Ferry on the Ohio River, thence with the Marion road excluding William Wallace house to K. P. LaRue excluding him and John Patton; thence to Harve Minners excluding him; thence to the Albert Wallace place excluding it; thence to the Ohio River above the Barnett and Croft farms; thence down the river to the beginning.

It is therefore ordered by the Court that the Sheriff of Crittenden County do open or cause to be opened a Poll in Tolu Common School District No. 10, on the 26th day of February, 1910, from six o'clock a. m. to four o'clock p. m. at the school house for white children in said District to take the sense of the legal white voters of said District upon the proposition, whether or not they will vote an annual Tax of 50 cents on each One Hundred Dollars worth of property belonging to white citizens and corporations and a Poll Tax of \$1.50 on each white male inhabitant over twenty-one years of age, residing in said District, for the purpose of maintaining a Graded Common School in said District, and for the erection and repairing of suitable buildings thereof, as provided in Article 10 Section 100, and following sections of Common School Law.


