FLUOR SPAR BRINGS BOOM IN CRITTENDEN

The shipment from Marion alone since January, has reached 16,000,000 of pounds, or 8,000 tons which has increased the deposits in the two banks in Marion a little less than \$100,000,000.

Some surpisingly rich discoveries have been made in old mines abandoned fifty years ago for the reason that the richness of both lead and zinc was not known. Every mine is now working full force and many of them putting in new machinery and increasing their capacity.




