Paducah, Ky., Aug.4-As a result of the inquisition into the killing of Axion Cooper by alledged night riders at a barbecue near Lamasco, in Lyon county, last Saturday, eight men were implicated by the coroner's jury. The accused are Roy injure eyes of a babe. Sold every- Merrick, Victor Mitchell, Bryan Hawkins, Fraud Murphy, Alonzo Gray, Jim Bozarth, Bart Creekmur and Sunk Creekmur. The two latter reside in Trigg county, and have not been arrested. Gray and Bozarth are charged with being accessories. Soldiers will go after the Creekmur men. All of the other prisioners are in jail at Eddyville, having been surrendered to Sheriff T. C. Cash by Col. Bassett, of the State Guards.

Col. Bassett, who took the dying statement of Cooper, read it at the inquest held by Coroner Henry Avels. It stated that Bart and Spunk Creekmur did the shooting that killed Cooper. It also named Roy Merrick, Victor Mitchell, Bryan Hawkins and Fraud Murphy as being implicated. The evidence shows that fifty-or seventy-five shots were fired, and that four of them took effect in Cooper's body. It also was proved that Cooper emptied his pistol, but none of the bullets took effect. A large number of people were present

at the inquest. Col. Bassett and Adjutant General P. P. Johnson, of Frankfort, were present at the inquest with a squad of soldiers to preserve order. No violence was offered. Adjutant General Johnson expressed himself as being surprised at the peaceable condition in which he found the


