## M'CREEARY INAUGURATED GOVERNOR TEUSDAY

### Rain Causes Little Change In Ceremonies.

Frankfort, Ky., Dec. 12.—A heavy downpour caused little change in the inauguration of Governor McCreary today. The oath was administered and the speeches delivered inside the capitol. The parade was reduced.

Thirty-six years ago Governor McCreary was the central figure in similar exercises. Today men who served with him during his first administration had places of honor.

The parade that escorted Governor McCreary from the governor's mansion in North Frankfort to the new capitol in South Frankfort, was composed of four companies of state guards, forty mounted police, thirty-five surviving members of the McCreary guards militia company of 1894, and over two thousand men composing Democratic marching clubs from Louisville, Lexington, Covington, Nicholasville, Lancaster and several other places, beside a large number of state officials, Congressmen, judges, and distinguished guests who rode in carriages and automobiles.

The guard of honor that walked on each side of the governor's carriage was composed of the twelve surviving members of the old McCreary guards, a military company that was formed in Frankfort in 1877, when McCreary was governor the first time. They wore no uniforms but large badges distinguished them.

The governor-elect and the retiring governor occupied a carriage by themselves and were cheered heartily all along the route of the parade by visitors of estimated number of 15,000 gathered from all parts of the state. The McCreary guards of the 1893 organization all rode white horses and wore blue overcoats and caps presenting a striking appearance.

Afterward, the oath was administered to Edward J. McDerroff of Louisville, newly elected lieutenant governor. The governor's party was then escorted to the state reception room in the capitol where for two hours visitors to the capital met the new executive.

Governor McCreary was the guest of Mayor J. H. Polsgrove for lunch at 3 o'clock. The celebration of the day was succeeded by the inaugural ball, especially brilliant, at the Capital Hotel.

### NEARING A DECISION.

At this writing, Monday morning, the 18th, all eyes are turned on Henderson, where is pending one of the largest tobacco sales of the season that of the Stemming District Tobacco Association. The sales committee was in session nearly all last week. They went home, however, Thursday evening and left the matter in the hands of General Manager Elliott.

An agreement had not been reached late Saturday night. Mr. Elliott gave out, that a final decision would probably be reached by today. That if the buyers would make some concessions from their demands, and he hoped that they would on riper reflection, a sale would probably be made and the crop be delivered to the buyers from the wagon. "But" continued he, if they do not the Association is in the last notch and preparation will be made for prizing the crop."

If this should be the decision, the factories will be opened as soon as possible, the tobacco received stemmed, and prized, by the Association.

Mr. Banks stated Saturday night, that it looked more like a trade to him than at any time since negotiations have been pending. No one can tell however, until a final decision is reached.

We will keep in close touch with the Henderson office and hope to be able to get that decision before going to press.

Washington, Dec. 14.—Attorney General Wickersham told Representative Olie James to day that in his opinion Clerk Walter Blackburn, of United States District Court at Paducah, and the other extra Federal clerks in Kentucky, will lose their places under the new law. Mr. James and Mr. Blackburn called on Mr. Wickersham for his opinion. This is virtually an official notice of the fact, to the extra clerks in Kentucky. Under the new law one clerk is to be attached to each Federal District Court at a salary of \$3,500, which a new bill seeks to raise to \$5,000.

### POPE HONORS OUR CARDINALS

Desires All But Americans Should Leave Rome.

Rome, Dec. 19.—It was the desire of the pope that the new cardinals should leave Rome as soon as possible, because this is a year of mourning for the church on ac-

count of the celebrations of Italian unity. But the pontiff made an exception in the cases of Cardinals Farley and O'Connell.

He told them that as their dioceses were so far from Rome, to prolong their visit, see their old friends and make new ones, and while here to participate in the work of the congregations to which they belong. Cardinal Farley and Cardinal O'Connell will therefore remain here until some date in January.


Cardinal Merry del Val, the papal secretary of state, said to Cardinal Farley:

"Your eminence needs rest, evidently, as everybody in New York is striving to prevent you from leaving Rome too soon. They want you to return at the right moment, and I can imagine what that means. The good people of New York want their welcome on your return to eclipse your enthusiastic send off."

### Pope Wishes to See Americans.

The pope evidently wishes to see the American cardinals often. They probably will have many audiences with the pontiff before they leave. It is an open secret that Pius X. is so impressed with the prophecy that he would pontificate not more than nine years—for another year only, perhaps—that it was by his wish a consistory was held in this year of mourning.

The sudden decision to create so many cardinals, the majority of whom are foreigners, and thus practically reform the sacred college, is believed to have been due to the pope's conviction that their services will be needed soon for a conclave to elect his successor.

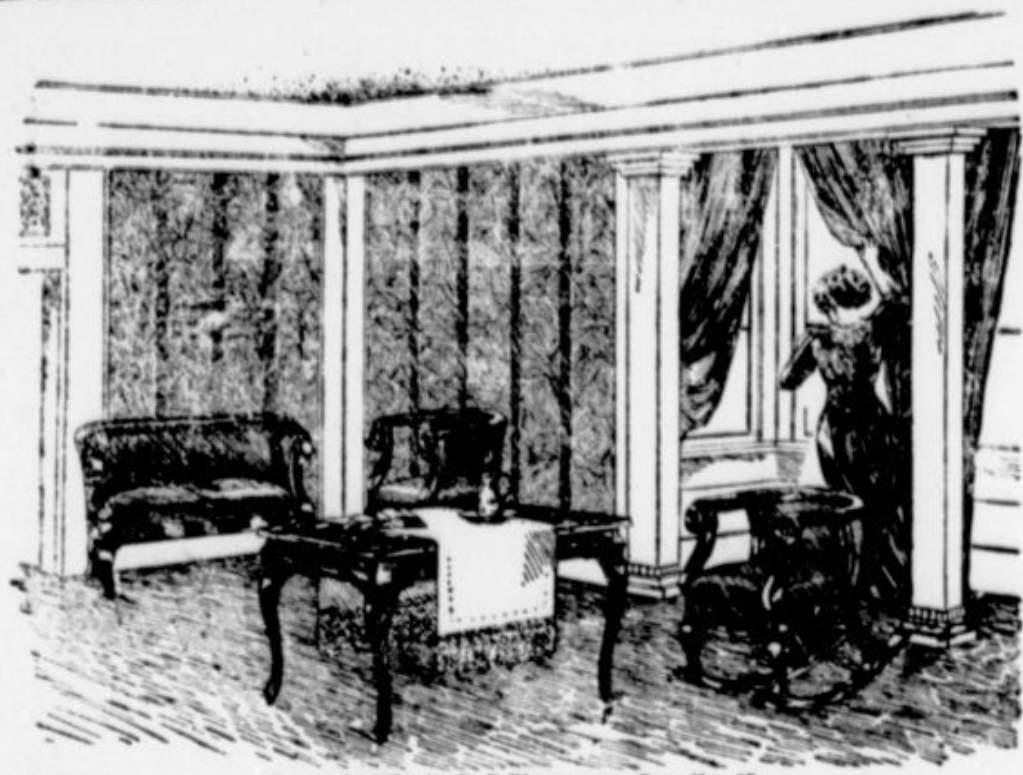

## BRADLEY DISHES OUT REAL PIE.

Settles Many Contests For Kentucky Post-offices.

### CAPITAL POLITICAL GOSSIP.

Washington, Dec. 9.—Senator W. O. Bradley conferred with the President for an hour to-day and as a result the following appointments are expected shortly: Winston Wiseman, of Danville, to be internal revenue collector for the Eighth Kentucky district succeeding J. Sherman Cooper, of Somerset.

Eugene C. Vance to be postmaster at Hawesville.

Carl Henderson to be postmaster at Marion.

The above appointments are almost certainties. In all probability the following appointments will also be made:

Clarence Matthews to succeed himself as postmaster at Maysville.

James P. Spillman to succeed himself as postmaster at Harrodsburg.

Coleman C. Wallace to succeed himself as postmaster at Richmond.

Covington Collectorship.

The Covington collectorship now held by Maurice Galvin, relic of the dominant days of R. P. Ernst, will not be acted on for sometime. It fact, it can be said that no steps whatever, either for the removal or retention of Galvin, have been taken thus far and whether or not they will be taken soon depends upon some inextra-party politics the nature of which is not divulged. Internal revenue collectors are appointed for indefinite terms and as Galvin can be removed at any time of the month or year it may be that his matter will go over into the next Republican national convention date.

Thatcher Will Hold On.

While at the White House Senator Bradley convinced himself, he said, that Gov. Maurice H. Thatcher, of the Canal Zone, will retain his \$14,000 job despite an open letter filed with the President recently by former Gov. Obadiah, of Colon, and general murmurs of discontent against the Governor which have reached official ears here in an unofficial way.

"In my judgement" said the Senator, "there is not the slightest probability that Mr. Thatcher will be interfered with. The charges against him were maliciously and falsely made by an irresponsible person."

The President and the Senator gave some of their time to a discussion of Gov. Thatcher, and Mr. Bradley was emphatic in his statement that the Panama official is sure to hold on.

Says Taft Has Kentucky.

Before he left Mr. Taft, Senator Bradley assured him that in his behalf every delegate from Kentucky to the Republican National convention will be instructed for the president. If there is any danger from movements for an uninstructed delegation or from the Senator said he had not heard of it.

All the expected appointments are of Bradley men and most of them end long and bitter contests. The victory of Bradley and Wiseman is a triumph over Gov. Wilson and over both of Kentucky's Republican congressmen, J. W. Langley and Caleb Powers. All of them were for Jackson Morris, private secretary to the Governor. Langley switched from Wisman to Morris during the time he was in Kentucky for the campaign, hoping finally to land on a winner. But the fate was still against him, and even his eleventh-hour change to the Morris camp proved to have been
