The sales committee was in session nearly all last week. They went home, however, Thursday evening and left the matter in the hands of General Manager Elliott.

An agreement had not been reached late Saturday night Mr. Elliott gave out, that a final decision would probably be reached by today. That if the buyers would make some concessions from their demands, and he hoped that they would on riper reflection, a sale would probably be made and the crop be delivered to the buyers from the wagon. "But" continued he, if they do not the Association is in the last notch and preparation will be made for prizing the crop."

If this should be the decision, the factories will be opened as soon as possible, the tobacco received stemmed, and prized, by the Association.


