We have no idea how to manage the muddle, for a muddle it is and a muddle it remains.


The doubtful period is the one the whole world is living today, vague uneasiness, restlessness, suspense, dissatisfied with things as they are.

But the greatest of all is. 'earthquake tremors' that are shaking the churches to their foundations and the growth of what is called the "New Thoght" the thought of the Platonic Philosophy. The New Thought has become overlaid by different human opinions. until it has be-

We spin on our earth in gathering storm-cloud, between two periods of time, the past and future. 

### TORNADO KILLS THIRTY-TWO PERSONS

One Hundred and Fifty Others Injured By Cyclone.

Thirty two persons are known to be dead, half a score were so severely injured they may die and a hundred and fifty others were hurt in two tornadoes, one of which swept over Southern Illinois and the other across Northern Illinois into Indiana

just before sun-set Sunday night. Twelve were killed at Bush, Ill., five at Willisville, names not obtainable; three at Reddick, Ill., three near Murphysboro, Ill.,

and nine at Morocco, Ind. Twelve dead were found at Bush, Ill., and it is expected that more will be found when the

debris is cleared away. Five persons were killed at Willisville, and sixteen houses

were demolished. A special train arrived at Murphysboro, Ill., to-night carrying forty-one persons who were injured at Bush, Ill., by the tornado. They were taken to a Mur-

physboro hospital. The St. Louis, Iron Mountain & Southern railroad station at Bush was destroyed, as were two rows of houses extending across the town.
