

#### METHOD OF DESTROYING RATS

Carbon Bisulphide is Used With cellent Results by Agricultural Bureau of Java.

A consular report gives the following method of destroying rats adopted by M. de Kruyff, of the agricultural bureau of Java. All visible rat holes were first stopped with earth to ascertain which holes were inhabited, for the inhabited holes were found reopened on the following day. Half a teaspoonful of carbon bisulphide was poured in each of these holes, and after a delay of a few seconds to allow the liquid to evaporate, the mixture of vapor and air was ignited. The result was a small explosion, which filled the hole with poisonous gases and killed all the rats almost instantly. A pound of bisulphide is sufficient for more than 200 rat holes. One hundred and thirty-one dead rate were found in 43 holes which were opened after the operation. It is further stated that satisfactory results in exterminating porcupines have been obtained by this method.

#### Canal at New Madrid Bend Only One Mile Across

miles below Hickman, which will change the channel of the river so as to leave the city of New inconvenience suffered by that town as a result of the recent overflow has served to stimulate the citizens to take this step. They are being cooperated with by some of the prominent men of

For many years the extreme bend of the river at that point, which is thirty five or forty miles around and only one mile across has been a proposition with which Missouri, Tennessee. and Kentucky have had to contend. The progress of navigation has been impeded by having to make a run of thirty-five or ferty miles when one mile would suffice. In addition, farm lands have been greatly damaged during overflows, Years ago this neck of land was seven miles wide and is now only one.

If the proposed canal is made it will be at a point near the old Continental building and will be a mile in width and a mile long, Money is being raised by the citizens to aid the Government in the work, as \$25,000 has already been raised at New Madrid. A great deal of interest is being taken in the project and it looks now as if something is going to be done.







There is to be no difference made in the charge on account of the distance the package is to be carried, and the rates charged by the express companies will be much higher in most cases.

The plan will be given a twoyears' test, beginning July 1. 1912, and will continue until June 30, 1914. The postmaster at the starting point of the rural route shall receive and deliver to carriers on rural routes, all packages not prohibited in the ordinary mails. The carriers shall collect along their routes all such packages as comes under this rule.

Postage shall be paid at the rate of 1 cent for each two ounces or less, and 2 cents for more than two ounces. For packages weighing more than ounces, the scale is graduated.

This graduated scale makes powers of ZEMO and ZEMO SOAP for the maximum charge for the package over the parcels post route 25 cents, much lower than the rates charged by express companies for similar packages under the most favorable condi-



GOOD THINGS FOR HUSBAND'S CRONIES.

By Martha McCulloch Williams. Man's part at home is to endure all things and eat all things, smiling as though he liked it all, whatever the facts in the case may be. And most men, I believe, nobly fill the part, Therefore, it seems to me fitting that every once in a while they should be given, by way of reward, a supremely masculine evening, whereat it is understood that woman's part is to stand in wait and supply the good seen cooked to perfection in paper

As to the nature of the evening, let the man himself decide.

Many things heretofore described in this column suit such festive occasions. Savory mouthfuls, hot chicken biscuits, hot oyster sandwiches, paperbagged oysters either in shells after Soyer's recipe, or cooked in quantity with butter, cream and lemon juice and their own liquor added laterthey all will satisfy hungry souls and what the palate for things potable, especially if supplemented with cheese crackers, also hot, salted nuts of any sort, olives warmed in a very little sherry, or crisp radishes and invariably good sharp cucumber pickle.

Sliced beef crisped is not to be despised, especially if the man of the house has a weakness for ale or 'alfand alf. To go with it make pricked them. The foundation is puff paste, and do not spare either shortening or work in its making. Put in a trifle more salt than for pastry uses, roll out less than a quarter inch thick, and cut in rounds two and a half inches across. Prick them well over and bake erisp in a well buttered bag. Sprinkle about half of them before baking lightly with dry mustard these seasoned biscuit separate from the plain ones and serve on separate plates. Instead of the mustard and pepper, you can use finely grated by neighbors. cheese between two biscuit after baking and beat in a bag until the cheese melts. Pimento cheese spread between such biscult, which have been very lightly buttered, also makes a well flavored mouthful.

Raisins cut very small, mixed with sharp cucumber pickle, also cut very fine, and worked smoothly through the best cream cheese with a very little French dressing or else a bare dusting of black pepper make a novel and appetizing filling for these biscuit sandwiches. You can split the biscuit, or make them very thin, butter the under one on top, and bake them together. The baking can be done in the afternoon and the biscuit heated before filling them with the ready prepared filling.

Serve all things from a buffet, even if you must improvise it, by up-ending a dry goods box and covering it with a cloth. Set things on it, and let the eaters walk up a themrelves, your self discreetly withdrawing, but remaining within call, so as to renew supplies at need. Herring a la Russe: Take four very soft-roed herrings. Get the fish monger to bone them for you. In the center of each place a big teaspoonful of French mustard and a bit of butter. mile. Price \$3.00 per 1000 Dust lightly with black pepper and put in a well buttered bag. Add to them half a wineglassful of either hock or sherry and half a wineglassful of either shallot or tarragon vinegar, as preferred. Cook for fifteen to eighteen minutes, according to the thickness of the fish, in a moderately hot oven. Dish up on a hot dish and serve with a beet salad. This is a most appetizing way of cooking herrings, but must be done in the bag if it is to be done to perfection.

Smelts Milanaise: Clean a dozen smelts, roll them in flour. Put an ounce of butter in a very hot dish, let it melt, roll the fish in this butter, sprinkle with a little cayenne pepper and a little grated Parmesan, and place them side by side in a well buttered paper bag. Cover lightly with bread crumbs and pour a little tomato sauce over each smelt. Seal up and cook for eight minutes in a very hot

oven. Serve with slices of lemon. Fresh Herring: Slit the fish on each side in a horizontal direction. Place on it a little mace, bay leaves, parsley, a small piece of onion and some salt and pepper. Add two tablespoonfuls of vinegar. Place in a paper bag, seal up, put on the broiler in a moderate oven for twenty min-

Care For Hopeless Cases.

By S. ADOLPHUS KNOPF, M. D. The criticism has been made, and I have heard it even from medical men, that it was a waste of money to bother with the hopelessly ill; that institutional treatment should be reserved for the curably affected who could again be made breadwinners and useful citizens. Those who made these criticisms are not even right from the utilitarian point of view, much less from the humanitarian aspect of the problem. One who has had any experience at all with tuberculosis as a physician or as a social worker will know that the consumptive, no matter in what stage of the disease, if he is untrained and uncared for, constitutes a great menace in his workshop and in his home. It must be evident that if the patient is confined all the time to his bed the danger of his constituting a center of infection in a crowded bedroom, often without light and air, is very great. Such a patient, because he is not taken care of at the right time and in the right place, costs a good deal more in the end, and not infrequently additional lives are sacrificed through his condition and environments. This is my answer from the utilitarian point of view to the statement that it is a useless expenditure to take care of the seemingly hopeless cases.
