

#### THE END OF TUBERCULOSIS

Cows and Hogs-and Men.

By PRESIDENT TAFT.

We have an agricultural depariment, and we are spending \$14,000,000 or \$15,000,000 a year to tell the farmers by the results of our research how they ought to treat the soil and how they ought to treat the hogs and how they ought to treat the cattle and the horses, with a view to having good hogs and good cattle and good horses. There is nothing in the constitution especially about bogs or cattle or horses, and if out of the public treasury at Washington we can establish a department for that purpose it does not seem to be a long step or a stretch of logic to say that we have the power to spend the money in a bureau of research to tell how we can develop good men and good women. Some of our enthusiastic conservators of national resources have calculated how much the life of each man and each woman in the community is worth to that community. I do not think it necessary to resort to that financial calculation in order to justify the saving of human life, such as can be accomplished by the results of research and advice that will procred from a properly established

bureau of health.


