GOV. McCREARY ISSUES PROCLAMATION.

October 8 has been officially designated as a clean-up day in Kentucky for the purpose of reducing fire dangers.

The general removal of rubbish in and about business houses, factories, residences and other places would amount to a big reduction in fire hazard. The putting in order of houses and premises in advance of winter would save many losses that are sure to come otherwise through defective flues, stoves and other heating arrangements and through the neglect of these precautions, which, while simple and easily practical, are of much importance to personal and general welfare.

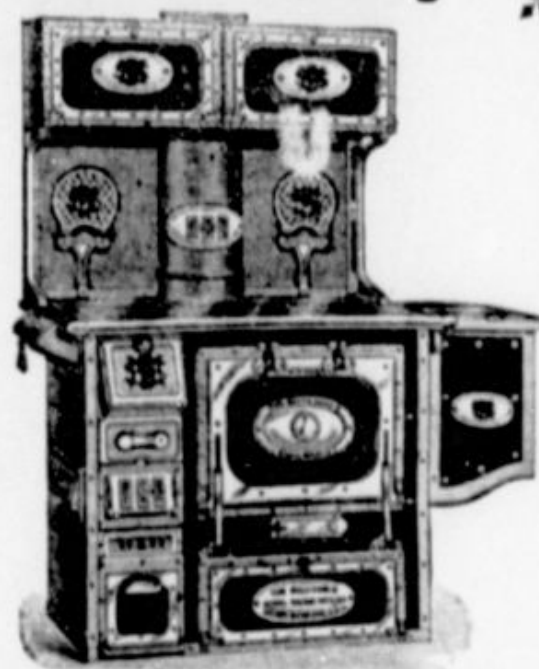

GEN. U. S. GRANT'S SON IS FOR WILSON.

My reason for stating this is that the people are becoming better acquainted with him and we are learning of the earnestness of the man and his high type of citizenship and his marvelous personality. I would not undertake to predict what will be the fate of the Republican party after this election but I am convinced that it will never be swallowed up by the followers of Roosevelt."

(Continued from Page One.)

many buildings by fire. A movement was begun for a "safe and sane Fourth" and it has progressed to such a degree that the yearly death rolls and damage bills in American cities have been cut down to a mere fraction of what they were in former years. This result indicates the possibility for good that lie in concerted effort. The people are just beginning to realize the enormity of the fire waste in the United States. When they are thoroughly aroused to action they will take steps to reduce it.

Last year the people of Kentucky paid out more than five and a quarter millions for fire insurance and the companies paid out more than three and a half millions in losses. This of course takes no account of the immense amount of property destroyed on which there was "not a dollar of insurance." Fire losses in the country at large amount to more than \$200,000,000, a year, and a big percentage of this heavy bill is due to the negligence of the people who fail to take the proper precautions against fire. It is possible to save much property and much distress by timely diligence in eliminating hazards, and clean-up day should be signalized by some effective work of that kind. This is forcefully put and should appeal to the people of our State in preserving the wealth thereof.

We are addressing you, hoping to have your assistance in the direction of calling the public's attention to the importance of confronting this proclamation. Trusting we will not be disappointed in our expectations, best to remain.

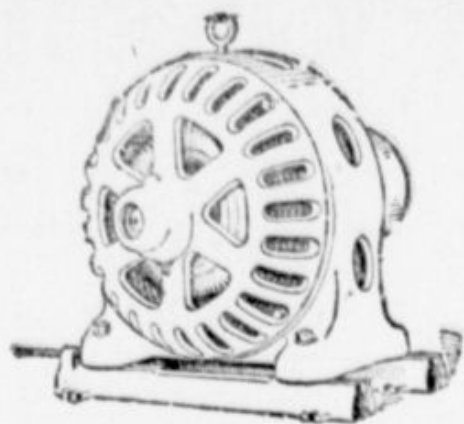

John J. Crittenden, the eloquent Kentucky lawyer of a past generation, was once defending a murderer. Every one knew that the man was guilty. A great crowd assembled to attend the trial and to listen to the speeches of the many able lawyers engaged on both sides of the case. When Crittenden arose to defend the prisoner silence prevailed in the court room. Everyone was eager to hear what the distinguished Kentuckian had to say. After an able argument in behalf of his client, Mr. Crittenden ended his eloquent plea in the following beautiful words:

"When God conceived the thought of man's creation, He called to him three ministering angels, who wait constantly upon the throne—Justice, Truth and Mercy—and thus addressed them:

"Shall we make this man?" "O God, make him not," said Justice, sternly, "for he will surely trample upon Thy laws."

"And Truth, what sayest thou?" "O God, make him not, for none but God is perfect, and he will surely sin against Thee."

"And Mercy, what sayest thou?"

The telephone system is a great help to the farmers as it brings them in direct communication with the city. By this they can sell all their products without going and seeing the purchaser.

The rural mail route is a great help to the farmers as they get their mail delivered to their door every day and do not have to go every day after it.

Like roads are a great help to the farmers as they can deliver their farm products at all times of the year even when it is muddy and bad.

The Parcel Post is much needed on the farm, then the farmers can get small packages direct from the city without having to send by express or freight.

Water works also make farm life more enjoyable.

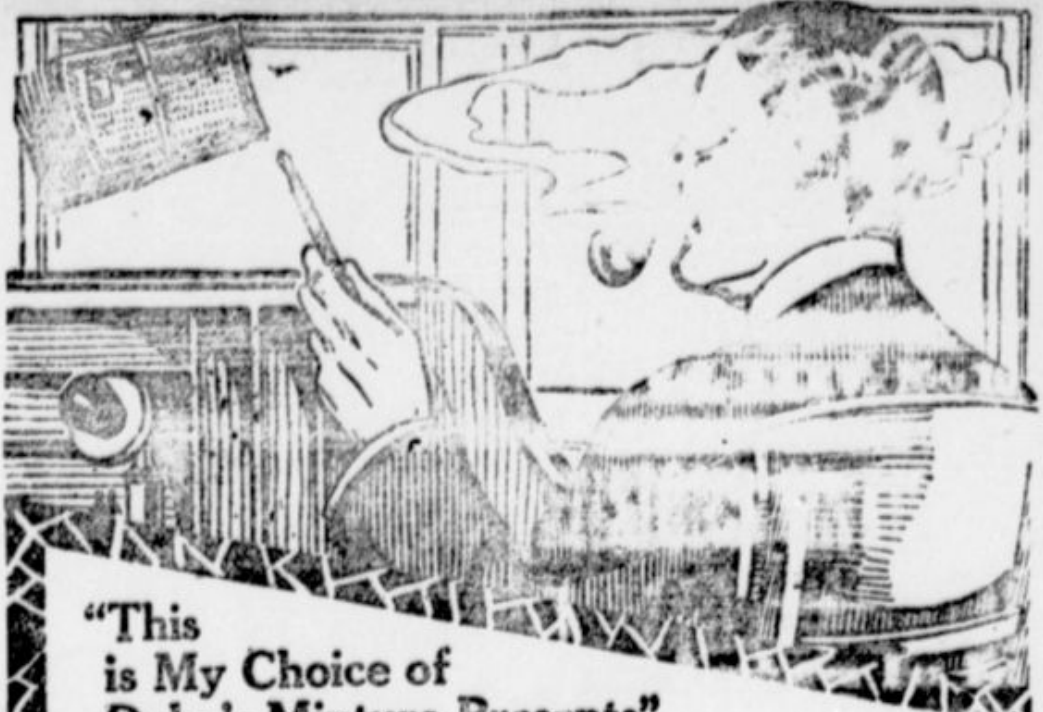

Cannot Support Taft for President.

Paducah, Ky., Sept. 30.—As a climax to a meeting filled with wrangling and dissatisfaction between the two factions of the Republican party, County Chairman, David Browning, offered his resignation last night and it was accepted. He explained that his purpose in resigning was to bring about harmony in the party, if possible, and because of the non-support of many Republicans and the Republican news-paper. With his resignation he filed two written reasons. One is that he is under the civil service rules.

His second reason is that he cannot support President Taft in his race for election because he does not approve of the fraudulent manner in which he obtained his nomination. Mr. Browning said that he was not a member of the Progressive party, but desired to be free and to vote for the man of his choice. It has been known for several months that Chairman Browning really indorsed Col. Roosevelt, but he claimed his allegiance to the Republican party. At the organization of the Progressive party, he was selected as a committee-man, from Kentucky.
