Plans for the new company are well advanced, as a statement issued says the first boat will leave will be the packet Queen City, now operating in the Pittsburg-Cincinnati trade. The packet Steel City, sister boat to the Queen City will leave Pittsburg Death Puts An End to later, and eventually there will be a third boat placed in the trade which will insure a Pittsburg-New Orleans packet from both terminals every ten days.

It is planned within a year to place two or three 300 foot steel hull packets in the trade. The largest boats now plying the Ohio river have a length of 365 feet over all. It is believed that the venture will be a paying proposition and that much activity in river circles will result.

Heavy Seas Encountered by Boat With Big Cargo.

Duluth, Minn., Oct. 31. - Capt. Edward Martin, of the steamer, Octorara, which is in port with the largest cargo-2,900 tons of package freight-ever brought west said today that after he had left Houghton the hardest seas he has ever encountered were met.

"The chief trouble was that the screw would go out of the water and spin," said Capt. Martin. "We had to fill two of the compartments to hold the stern down and we were drawing twenty feet in the stern, but the wheel would go out. The water submerged us six feet as we came west from the portage, and all other ships remained in shelter.



But the breed that produces great horses in the past is still useful, particularly for the production of saddle and cavalry horses, and it should be perpetuated regardless of the race course.
