Notable Increase Shown in Output of Both Metals.

According to J. P. Dunlop, of the United States Geological Survey, 151 tons of galena concenthe guests when they noticed the trates having an average lead content of 70.2 per cent were the situation." But not a word shipped to smelters from the fluorspar mines in Kentucky in 1912. No shipments were reported in 1911. The quanity of zinc concentrates shipped increased from 467 tons in 1911 to 1,243 tons in 1912, and the total value of zinc concentrates increased, from \$10,604 to \$41,391. The recoverable metallic content of the lead concentrates was valued at \$9.540. In some years smelters have recovered as high as 3 ounces of silver to the ton of galena concentrates, but no recovery of silver was reported from the concentrates smelted in 1912. 



# **BRYAN SENT TO** SMOOTH TROUBLE Objects to the Handling of Fourth

President Wilson Sends Secretary of State to California.

Washington, April 28.-After an hour's conference at the white house tonight President Wilson directed Secretary of State Bryan to proceed immediately to Sacramento. Cal., and co-operate with Governor Johnson and the legislature in framing a law regarding the ownership of land by aliens that would not conflict with the treaty obligations of the United States, particularly with Japan. Secretary Bryan will leave to morrow arriving at Sacramento Monday.

The commission is headed by Gov. Hiram W. Johnson. The bill presented by the Southern Pacific Company for the Knox trip calls for \$1,387.18.
