

Clifton, Ariz., August 18.-Nine men were killed and one probably fatally hurt late last come to work. Evil Turkey Trot and Tan-Go Condemned by Bishop.

"There is no need of my issuing a formal regulation regarding the immoral dances now in vogue." said the Rt. Rev. dennis O'Donaghue, D.D., bishop of Louisville, when shown a dispatch stating that Archbishop Moeller, of Cincinnati, and Biss hop Byrne, of Nashville, had forbidden priests to absolve persons who engaged in those objectionable dancees.

"Almighty God. and not bishops, forbade immorality and all other sin and every Catholie knows full well that every sin of impurity, wether it be of deed or look or thought, is against the laws of God. What else do they need? These dances, the tango, the turkey trot, the bunny hug, and the rest of them are immoral and every Catholic who dances them know that he is committing a moral sin, trampling the laws of God beneath foot, liabling himself to eternal damnation and giving bad example to those outside of the church. What need, therefore, is there for me to condemn then when God has forbidden them along with all sin and every thing that leads

"There often are mistakes in the way in which these things are given out," continued the bishop, "As I have said before, the plain fact in the case is that any immoral dance or anything precious blood is a mortal sin. That is all there is to it and every child in our parochial schools knows what that means.

"Now its all right to warn the people against an evil that is doing harm at a certain time, as these dances now are, but to say that a person who sins by dancing them cannot be forgiven is simply not true. Murder and theft and lust and every other sin can be forgiven, if the person is penitent; that is, if he is truly sorry for the sin, purpases to mend his life and to avoid the occasion of his fall from the grace of God. In the present case it would mean that one who had sinned by dancing these immoral dances would have to quit dancing them, else his repentance is not sincere.

"In this case the confession whole thing is void, but it does not require a bishop or a priest to tell our people this. They learn it as soon as they learn their a b c's.

"If a formal condemnation of these dances were needed, why most assuredly, I would have to condemn them. Turkey trotting and pig trotting and horse trotting are all right for turkeys and horses and pigs, but they are not the things for men and women, and especially for those who have been redeemed by the blood of Christ, and who knows the law of God, as Catholics do. The Catholic who has to be told this is a poor Catholic, if one at all. He needs to study his catechism, thats all. God help

"I believe that the whole trouble in this matter is that it has not been properly presented to the non-Catholic public by certain newspapers. I hope however, that is now clear."-Courier Journal.



GOD'S COVENANT AT MOUNT SI-NAI.

Exodus 19:1-6-Aug. 31. "Let us have grace, whereby we may offer service well-pleasing to God with reverence and awe."—Hebrews 12:28. R. V.

WO months after the Passover deliverance, the Israelites arrived at Mt. Sinai; but on their way they had two valuable lessons respecting God's grace and power. At Rephidim, Moses in the name of the Lord smote the rock, and from it gushed water, abundantly refreshing Israel, and as a rivulet followed them through much of their subsequent journey. St. Paul, by inspiration declares that the rock represented Christ, that the smiting of the rock represented the putting of Christ Up And Down The Faver e t Did to shameful death, but that only thus is the Water of Life provided for whoseever will drink.

Israel journeyed on, but encountered new obstacles. The Amalekites, a warlike people, considered Israel's coming as an invasion of their com-

try, and attacked them. Naturally Israel was at a disadvantage. Yet God gave them the victory. Moses, upon a high hill, lifted his hands in prayer for the people. While he did so, success was theirs: but when

be ceased thus to pray, Amalek preten rock. vailed. Aaron and Hur assisted in holding up Moses' hands until the battle terminated successfully for Israel. God thus indicated that without Moses they could do nothing.

The Royal Priesthood Proffered. God's dealings with Israel were in accord with His great covenant with Abraham-"In thee and in thy Seed shall all the families of the earth be blessed." Neither Moses nor his followers could possibly have understood the full import of this great oathbound Promise; for it is double, the piritual portion being hidden until the First Advent. Even since then, St. Paul assures us, it is a hidden mystery. appreciated by few.


The Promise is divided into three parts: (1) Abraham (and all the Andent Worthies, whom he represented) was to have a share; (2) Abraham's Seed was to be the channel of blessing; and (3) all the families of the earth vere to be blessed through these channels. But only by the light of the Holy Navies of World Spirit during this Gospel Age are these lepths of the Abrahamic covenant

While the Israelkes knew that they vere the natural heirs of the promises, it was proper that they also know that they would be unsuitable in blessing the other nations with God's Law unless they could both keep that Law and instruct others to keep it. So a Law Covenant was made with them, and Moses appointed its mediator.

Typical of New Covenant. St. Paul, in Hebrews 12:18-24, points us to the antitype of today's lesson. As Israel was delivered from Pharaoh and his hosts, so ultimately mankind will be delivered from Satan and his fallen angels, and from all evil influences. As Israel's journey brought them to Mt. Sinai and the Law Covenant, so the journey of God's people

St. Paul explains this, saying, "God gave Jesus to be the Head over the Church, which is His Body." See St. Peter's explanation of "Prophet like

into Moses" in Acts 3:22, 23, 19-21. The antitype of our lesson will be the inauguration of the New Covenant, at the Second Advent of Jesus. The basis of this better Covenant was completed at Calvary. Our Lord has since been completing His "better sacrifices" by presenting the bodies of His saints to God. (Romans 12:1.) 

ARRESTED ON A SERIOUS CHARGE

Government Postal Inspecto Swears To Warrant Charging Ford's Ferry Postmaster with Fraud.

James L. Rankin, for many years postmaster at Ford's Ferry, a little village in the northwestern part of Crittenden county, was arrested yesterday morning by Deputy United States Marshal Elwood Neel. He is charged with the misapropriation of several hundred dollars of government funds while

serving in his official capacity. Rankin was taken to Hopkinsville, Ky, by Marshal Neel, where he waived an examining trial before United States Commissioner A. H. Clark and entered a plea of "not guilty." Rankin was released on a \$500 bond. His trial will probably be called before Judge Walter Evans in United States district court here next November.

THE END OF TUBERCULOSIS

Consumption-What It Is.

By DR. WILLIAM S. ELY. Tuberculosis of the lungs, the most contagious and fatal form of the disease, is caused by the presence of tubercle bacilli (germs) in the lungs. The germ multiplies rapidly and feeds on the lung substance, which it gradually destroys.

The important symptoms of consumption are cough expectoration (or spitting of phlegm containing the tubercular germs). hemorrhage (or bleeding from the lungs), fever (increased temperature of the body, especially in the evening), difficulty in breathing, pains in the chest, night sweats, loss of appetite, emaciation (loss of flesh).

The germ of consumption enfirst, by being inhaled or breathed into the lungs; second, by being ingested-that is, eaten in tuberculous food or drunk in or water contaminated with the germ; third, by inoculation or the penetration of tuberculous substance through a wound in the skin. Of these three the first is the most impor-
