

Allies Cancel Order Army Mules.

SAYS IT ISN'T?

Because of the German submarine blockade of the British Isles, about fifty mules, which Ohio. were brought to Henderson yesterday to be sold to the agent of a St. Louis firm for the Allies, were taken back and stabled at home. The agent received orders to buy no more mules altho a sale had been advertised for several weeks.

The St. Louis firm had con tracted to furnish France, England and Russia with 10,000 mules for army service and now there are 7,000 mules in the stock yards at St. Louis which cannot be sold, as a result of the blockade.

The Allies had placed a number of contracts in the United States and the contractors had sub-let these contracts. Dangers to shipping caused the Allies to cancel all orders for mules on this side. - Henderson Gleaner.

ALF a century ago there were ten million acres of land, withis half a thousand miles of Omaha, upon which not even a blade of grass would grow. WHY, WHEN AND HOW L'ESUS' SECOLD ADVENT

Billy Sunday's View Cotter Than

Bible Views Long Euried Now Coming to Light-Erroneous Teachings of the Creeds - Reasonabianess of Bible's Presentation - Instead of World-Burning, Messiah's Kingdom Will Bring World-Wide Blessing-Anarchy Destructive as Fire Will Prepare Way.



Norfolk, Va., February 28.-Pastor Russell, addressing a large audience here today, discussed Advent, from the text. "If I go away. I will come again and receive you." (John 14:3.) He complimented Billy Sunday by

saying that although Billy's teachings do not come up to the Rible, nevertheless he is far ahead of "Orthodoxy" on this subject.

The Pastor agrees with Mr. Sunday in teaching that our Lord Jesus is coming to establish a world-wide Empire which will bless all mankind with fullest opportunity to do right. But he disagrees with Mr. Sunday's theory that the billions who died during the past six thousand years in ignorance of Christ will suffer to all eternity be cause of that ignorance. Those bil-Hons include all-who have never truly heard of Jesus, in heathen lands and at home where, according to Mr. Sunday, some were led straight down to Hell by the churches.

The Bible thought, the speaker declared, is altogether different-that the dead are in neither Purgatory nor a fiery Hell, but in the Bible Hell-the tomb; and that "all that are in their graves shall bear the voice of the Son of God and come forth." The saintly will come forth to glory with Christ in His Kingdom; others, to a resurrection-a raising up out of sin and death -by judgment .- John 5:28, 29. R. V.

Those who have not intelligently heard of Jesus and His salvation are not on trial now. Their death is the penalty of Adam's sin, not of personal rejection of Jesus. It is to give these the opportunity of a judgment, trial, during Christ's Millennial Reign that they will be brought from the tomb. As all died through one man's disobedence, all will come forth to an opportunity of everlasting life through the obedience of the other man-Christ. The resurrection of the dend their only hope. "Orthodoxy" Is Still Worse.



THE CHURCH AS **ASOCIAL CENTER**

A Broader Sphere for Religion-New Field for the Rural Church.

By Peter Radford

Lecturer National Farmers' Union The social duty of the rural church is as much a part of its obligations as its spiritual side. In expressing its social interest, the modern rural church does not hesitate to claim that it is expressing a true religious instinct and the old-time idea that the social instincts should be starved while the spiritual nature was overfed with solid theological food, is fast giving way to a broader interpretation of the functions of true religion. We take our place in the succession of those who have sought to make the world a fit habitation for the children of man when we seek to study and understand the social duty of the rural church. The true christian religion is essentially social—its tenets of faith being love and brotherhood and fellowship. While following after righteousness, the church must challenge and seek to reform that social order in which moral life is expressed. While cherishing ideals of service, the rural church which attains the fullest measure of success is that which enriches as many lives as it can touch, and in no way can the church come in as close contact with its members as through the avenue of social functions.

The country town and the rural community need a social center. The church need offer no apology for its ambition to fill this need in the community, if an understanding of its mission brings this purpose into clear consciousness. The structure of a rural community is exceedingly complex; it contains many social groups, each of which has its own center, but there are many localities which have but one church and although such a church cannot command the interest of all the people, it is relieved from the embarrassment of religiously divided communities.

Social Needs Imperative.

The average country boy and girl have very little opportunity for real enjoyment, and have, as a rule, a vague conception of the meaning of pleasure and recreation. It is to fill this void in the lives of country youth that the rural church has risen to the necessity of providing entertainment, as well as instruction, to its membership among the young. children and young people of the church should meet when religion is not even mentioned. It has been found safest for them to meet frequently under the direction and care of the church. To send them into the world with no social training exposes them to grave perils and to try to keep them out of the world with no social privileges is sheer folly. There is a social nature to both old and young, but the social requirements of the young are imperative. The church must provide directly or indirectly some modern equivalent for the husking bee, the quilting bee and the singing schools of the old days. In one way or another the social instincts of our young people must have opportunity for expression, which may take the form of clubs, parties, picnics or other forms of amusement. One thing is certain, and that is that the church cannot take away the dance, the card party and the theatre unless it can offer in its place a satisfying substitute in the form of more pleasing recreation.

Universal Instinct for Play.

In providing for enjoyment the church uses one of the greatest methods by which human society has developed. Association is never secure until it is pleasurable; in play the in stinctive aversion of one person for another is overcome and the social mood is fostered. Play is the chief educational agency in rural communities and in the play-day of human childhood social sympathy and social habits are evolved. As individuals come together in social gatherings. their viewpoint is broadened, their ideals are lifted and finally they con stitute a cultured and refined society It is plain, therefore, that the church which aims at a perfected so elety must use in a refined and exalted way the essential factors in social evolution and must avail itself of the universal instance for play. If the church surrounds itself with social functions which appeal to the young among its membership, it will fill a large part of the lamentable cap in rural pleasures and will reap the richest reward by promoting a higher and better type of manhood
