WHAT KANSAS HAS DONE.

In Speaking of The Good Statewide Prohibition Has Done Harry McChesney Said.

I have given these few illus trations to show how the leaders of other nations regard this question. Let me add a few statements from eminent citizens of this country. In a speech in Chicago on March 31st. John P. St. John, former Governor of Kansas, said: "Thirty-five years ago our state was part of what was known as the wild, wooly West. It was full of saloons, gambling dens and other evil resorts. Today, after thirtyfour years of prohibition, there is not a common drunkard in 96 of the 105 counties of the State.' I have in my possession a letter from the Hon. J. T. Botkin, Secretary of State of Kansas, enclosing a copy of a letter he had written to N. B. Raymond, of Rochester, N. Y., under date of March 11, 1915, in which he says among other things, the follow-

That under prohibition the annual expenditure for liquor in Kansas is only \$1.25 per capita, as against \$21.00, the average for the United States:

That illiteracy in Kansas has been reduced to two per cent., the lowest in the United States,

That there were 48 counties out of 105 in the State that did not send a prisoner to the penitentiary last year, and that 87

That more than a dozen Kansas counties have not called a jury in ten years to try a criminal case:

That 53 counties were without prisoners in their jails and 28 without paupers in their almshouses last year:

That the Kansas death rate is the lowest in the world: 71-2 for each 1000 persons:

That bank deposits have doubled in the last ten years;

That the per capita of wealth will buy. in Kansas is the greatest of any state in the Union, being approximately \$1,700 for every man woman and child in the State.




