HUERTA JAILED FOR LACK OF BOND

Re-arrested Yesterday With Five Others on Additional Charges of Conspiracy.

El Paso, Tex., July 3.—Victoriano Huerta, one time dictator of Mexico, is in jail here tonight in company with five others arrested with him today on fresh charges of conspiracy to violate United States neutrality. Six others arrested early in the week are at liberty on bonds, but the whereabouts of Pascual Orozco is a source of anxiety to federal officials.

Orozco eluded six guards at his local residence and disappeared early today. Huerta's incarceration was caused by his failure to provide a \$15,000 bond, in addition to bail of a like amount under which he was released after his first arrest.

WHY HE IS FOR THE COUNTY UNIT

Stanley Speaks At Horse Cave.

Stanley spoke at Horse Cave with his heart all aglow for the county unit like all the wholesale liquor houses and all the distilleries in the State.

Why is he for the County Unit? Why are the liquor forces of the State preaching the County Unit doctrine? Doctrine that is excluding their liquor from scores of counties in the State? It is because this great wave of reform has declared it as law and they dread the impending doom of a bigger unit than a County Unit. The idea of Stanley, the recognized tongue of the liquor forces being for the County Unit when he sweated blood four years ago in fighting it in the Convention at Louisville, and we understand that there are sworn affidavits to the effect that he sought to get the delegates from McLean county to vote against the County Unit plank entering the Democratic platform, but they said, we were instructed to vote for that plank and he answered: D—n the instructions, vote against it anyhow.

McChesney is for the County Unit with all his soul, provided he can get something bigger of the same kind, while Stanley and the distilleries are for the County Unit to keep from having something worse of the same kind. —Hart County News. Adv.

BIG RAILROAD QUILTS WHISKEY BUSINESS.

C. & O. Goes Dry.

Lexington, Ky., June 20.—(Special.)—The C. & O. officials here have been notified that the trains on that line will be "dry" after June 30. Heretofore the dining and buffet cars on this road have held license from the States through which they passed to sell liquors while going through "wet" territory, though the sales had to be stopped whenever a "dry" county was reached. Now, however, so much of the country along the roadway is prohibition that it kept the persons in charge of the liquor service in such a stew over opening and closing their bars that it has been decided that the profits of the business do not pay for the trouble, and when the licenses expired on June 30th they were not renewed and the trains are "dry" from one end of the road to the other. A prohibition law will soon go into effect in Virginia, and is already in operation in West Virginia, while Kentucky and other states through which the road passes have local option laws. The operation of the local option laws prevents the sale of liquor while trains are standing in dry towns or passing through dry counties, and the difficulty of keeping the porters and waiters on the train correctly informed of the exact stops on the road which are wet is another factor in closing up the entire business. The passenger department of the road has found that there is considerable dissatisfaction among their passengers who are served with liquor without question at lunch or in the buffet car, but who cannot get a glass of wine with their dinner because the train has entered "dry" territory. The annoyances to passengers by well meaning waiters who suggest that the train will soon be in "wet" territory for half an hour, and the danger of sales being made at the wrong milepost have also helped to make the change. It is said that since the dry spots became so numerous, travelers who want liquor provide themselves with it in advance, which further reduces the sales in the cars. —Advertisement.

Twenty or thirty years hence the boys who now inhabit our homes and pass as little fellows upon our streets will be our business men, our men of affairs and of families. Fleeting are the years which transform our boys into mature manhood. Monday afternoon, June 28th, it being the opening day of the June term of the Crittenden Circuit Court, a short time was given by the court for the candidates to speak to the voters, and short speeches were made by Messrs. Gibson and Blue candidates for Circuit Judge, Baker and Laffoon, candidates for Commonwealth's Attorney and Judge Gordon, candidate for Appellate Judge.

Judge Blue took occasion to denounce the report; that is being circulated in some sections of the district, that he made the

race for County Judge in 1910 in the interest of the Republican party. Everyone conversant with affairs in Crittenden county knows that John W. Blue, Jr. was solicited by the Democratic committee to make the race because the committee after canvassing the matter with voters realized that he could make a stronger race than any other one in the county.

When first requested by the committee to make the race Judge Blue told the committee that he did not want the office, and if he made the race it would be at a sacrifice and suggested that the committee should adjourn for a month and canvass the voters as to whether they wanted a Democratic candidate, and if so whom. This the committee did, and when it met again it was unanimously decided by the committee to nominate a candidate for County Judge, and that John Blue would make a stronger race than anyone else. Upon being assured by the committee that it was the wish of the Democratic party for him to make the race, Mr. Blue stated that he was not a candidate, and it would be a sacrifice for him to make the race but that he was a Democrat and would make the race. He was accordingly nominated and elected by a large majority, and made one of the best Judges Crittenden county has ever had.
