



This is the Squaw corn variety. Other corn growing on the place is the Country Gentleman and Mexican June corn. The latter is very rank growing, some of the stalks being eight or nine feet high. Watermelons are half grown, and will be ripe in a few weeks, and some canteloupes are almost ripe. Among the other vegetables that were observed on this model little truck farm were blackeyed peas, frijole beans, okra, tomatoes, onions, squash, and others that we do not now remember.


#### Prof. V. O. Gilbert Spoke In Marion Last Week




