



### DESCRIBES WOUNDS OF MODERN BULLET

#### Projectile of Present Less Dangerous Than Older Ones.

New York.-Major P. C. Pauntleroy of the United States medical army corps writing in the Medical Record tells of the wounds caused by modern weapons of war. Major Fauntieroy

says in part:
"It may be said in general that the wounds inflicted by the projectiles of the modern firearms are not so extensive as they were from the older weapons, and also that their treatment

is correspondingly less difficult. "Let us consider the effects of the old time larger and lower velocity pro jectiles, for by comparison with those of the modern small, steel jacketed. with LOCAL APPLICATIONS, as they cannot reach the seat of the disease. "The old round musket balls were of soft lead and from 0.702 to 0.75 inch in diameter. Their initial velocity was from 600 to 700 feet per second.

"The destruction of the soft tissue by these round balls of low velocity was in proportion to their diameter. their mechanical effects being that the tissues were stretched, as it were, to permit their passage.

The wound of entrance was about the size of the ball, the wound giving the impression of having been punched out. This ball occasioned a track of devitalized tissue greater than its diam eter. The wound of exit was irregular in shape, with everted edges and al ways larger in the skin than that of

the entrance.

"On striking bone this ball usually flattened itself and nearly always re mained in the tissues. Although this round ball, at its maximum velocity. could occasion great damage, the co noidal bullets of a later date occasione much more extensive injuries. Exten sive displacement of the splinters of bone in the track was caused by the fracture was fissured. The extensive devitalization of the soft parts, togeth er with extensive damage to the bone. offered a field with little resistance To these pathological characteristics must be attributed the great danger to life occasioned by these old round bul-

"Having considered the wounds oc casioned by the old large caliber round and elongated lead bullets of low veloc ity, we are better prepared to understand the effects of the modern small caliber steel jacketed, high velocity

"It may be said in a general way that the effects of these bullets differ as they occur in one of four zones: "In the first zone (0 to 500 yards) we

see explosive effects. "In the second zone (500 to 1,000 yards) we see penetrating effects. "In the third zone (1,000 to 2,000

yards) we see simply wounding effects. "In the fourth zone (2,000 to 2,500 fects."

#### NEW DIET FOR ANGLER FISH. LAST TRIBUTE TO NURNBERG.

United States Cruiser Played German Air as Ship Sailed Out to Destruction. Berlin.-The strains of the German national hymn played by the band of an American cruiser anchored in the port of Honolulu were the last friendly greetings for the crew of the ill fated German cruiser Nurnberg. The Nurnberg was destroyed in the battle off the Falkland islands on Dec. 8.

Relatives of a sailor on the Nurnberg have just received his last letter, in which he tells how "three thundering cheers were the response from us as the band aboard an American cruiser which lay anchored in the port struck up the tune of our national hymn. It may be the final adieu for us. Pt was a noble, inspiring thing for those American sailors to do. They knew that outside the harbor the ene my in superior force was waiting to

send us to the whales for food."

The letter is dated Oct. 11, 1914, and was written as the Nurnberg steamed out to join Admiral von Spee's squadron, which was later sent to the bottom by the British squadron. The letter, together with other mail, was given to the captain of a neutral sailing vessel which the Nurnberg met just outside the port.

St. Louis.-Ernest Smith, five years old, deaf, dumb and almost blind, was taken from the City hospital three years ago after his mother deserted him by the Missouri branch, International Sunshine society, and is in a fair way of becoming as remarkable as Helen Keller, according to medical authorities, specialists and instructors in

the Missouri School For the Blind. The child, who three years ago was not expected to live and who was declared to be mentally defective, is an excellent proof of what care, the propr treatment and accomplish. At five he displays a healthy devotion to the sports indulged in by boys of his age the world over and an alarming interest in the carry-

ing out of mischlevous pursuits, Since an operation performed several months ago, which restored to him in a slight measure the use of his left eye, he has displayed a sense of touch and perception which have set his elders wondering and which has determined them to secure for him the best advantages obtainable to make of hinr-

He recognizes colors readily, is able to distinguish his Sunday clothes from those of the every day variety, he is quick to notice anything new in the vearing apparel or speech of the vistor in the home in which he is being ared for, and be makes known his Nkes and dislikes in an emphatic manner in everything running the gamut from foodstuffs to persons,

In the opinion of Mrs. F. W. Baumhoff, for fourteen years president of the Missouri Sunshine society and who resigned that post in order to her time wholly to caring for blind children under school age, the child's powers of observation are nothing short of remarkable.

#### RAISES BEES ON BOTTLE.

With 580 Colonies Feeds Young on Sugar and Water.

Chicago.-If you are an apiarist and our bees do not thrive in the long winter season try raising them on a bottle. H. H. Thale of Maywood, Mo., who has 500 colonies of the little honey makers, has found this method suc-

cessful. Mr. Thale resorted to bottle feeding of baby bees when he discovered that cold spells materially cut down the number of bees. He places the bottle on the ledge of the hive, and through a little valve a mixture of sugar and water trickles into a steel trough which extends into the hive. It furnishes the bees plenty of nourishment and helps along during the breeding

Mr. Thale last year marketed 11,000 pounds of honey.



Field ambulance gages. bearers carry them to the advanced dressing station for adjustment splints, dealing with hemorrhages, etc. Ambulance wagons then take the wounded to the main dressing station, where there is an operating room or tent and accessories for performing urgent oper-

"At the collecting hospital further surgical aid is given if required, and then the wounded are taken to the base hospital."

## U.S. EMPLOYMENT BUREAU IS OPENED

Labor Department to Act as a Glearing Fouse,

#### MOVEMENT COVERS COUNTRY

Complete Preliminary Efforts to Bring Together Those Who Want Work and Those Who Want Workers - Postmasters Distribute Application Blanks to Unemployed.

Washington.-The department of labor has completed the preliminary work in connection with the federal employment bureau, and necessary blanks are being sent to employers throughout the country and to postoffices for distribution to those who are seeking employment.

In a speech before the convention of the American Federation of Labor at Seattle, Wash., on Nov. 12, 1913, Secretary Wilson said he appeared to convey the statement "that the department of labor as now organized and directed will be utilized to co-operate with the great trades union movement." The Evansville Courier. retary Wilson also stated that "the

organic act creating the department of labor, in its ultimate analysis, presuposes dealing with trades unions and through trades unions for the better ment of wage earners, and properly so." He added: "All trades union movements may profit by the assistance of this department of the government. Of what value would it be to mediation to apply to the department of labor to interfere, to use its good offices in an effort to bring about an adjustment of a trade dispute, if the workers themselves are unorganized, if the workers themselves have no eco-

mic ferce that they can use?" The postmasters throughout the country will distribute the application blanks to the unemployed, who will fill them out and return them to the postmaster to be forwarded to the department of labor postage free.

The applications for employment are designed to cover practically all forms of eipployment, both skilled and un skilled, in addition to domestic wor and farm labor. The applicants are required to answer numerous questions as to age, height, weight, trade, nawhile you will meet a man who is so tionality, qualification for labor other ken, name of two former employers, reason for loss of last employment and wages expected,

One difficulty in the present federal employment bureau plan is the ques-tion of transportation. On the application blanks the unemployed are ask ed to state what, if any, money they can afford to pay for their transporta tion to a job, and the employer also is asked to state what, if any, money he will advance for transportation to bring the unemployed to the job he de sires to fil. It is obvious that the average man out of work cannot be prepared to pay his own transportation if the milroad fare amounts to very


