

aviator and his camera have created a new kind of geography. The birds-eye view, with its entirely imaginary authenticity, has been supplanted by the lens that, left alone, tells I lie nor relates any imaginative detail says Cincinnati Times-Star. Photographs taken by the aviators of the trenches along the Somme, for instance, are the verities of the furrowed and burrowed landscape depicted. But the aviator and his camera have now entered a new department of their neo-geography. The aero lens, if we may call it such, has turned its optic from dizzy heights upon just plain real estate that some dealer has offered for sale. The result is that an advertisement of a country house, with its outbuildings situated among the surrounding 23 acres, appears in a current magazine, accompanied by an aviator's eye view of the demesne. Every detail is revealed with precision and with a verisimilitude that no map or plan could convey. The future of aero geography should be assured. Within a few years every surveyer may be forced to supplement his level and line with an airplane and a camera to meet the more modern demands of his patrons.

THE AERO MAP.

How Much the Little Heroes Need Our Help!

It is less theatrical to give a bowl of soup to a hungry, frightened little child than to stanch the wound of a en soldler in the fighting line, but years the American Red Cross has undertaken to care for the suffering civilians in war-torn Europe as well as to nurse the wounded fighters. These little ones are just as heroic, in their way, as any man who charges the German guns. And the children are often ounded, toe.

Here is an extract from a letter written by Mrs. Marian Bonsall Davis, who was for six months a volunteer worker in France, among those noncombatants who are almost hourly in danger from German guns and bombs:

"Because so many bombs fall on the town of Nancy, and because the place is sometimes bombarded, the children all know that on a certain signal they must run into the cellar of the nearest house marked with the great red cross. There, perhaps, they will have protec-

"There are children in the hospitals, victims of the bombs. There is one little girl, both legs taken off by a German bomb, hugging tight her dolly, with never a smile on her grave face.

"There are two little boys who also suffered amputations because of the bombs. They begged to be allowed to lie in the hospital ward with the wounded soldiers, and when the soldiers heard of the request they smiled and said "bien!" (It is well.) And now the little fellows are inordinately proud of the mutilations that permit them to lie in the ward of crippled sol-

It is less theatrical to give a bowl of soup to a hungry, frightened little child than to stanch the wound of a allen soldler in the fighting line, but years the American Red Cross has undertaken to care for the suffering civilians in war-torn Europe as well as to nurse the wounded fighters. These little ones are just as heroic, in their way, as any man who charges the German And the children are often ounded, too.

Here is an extract from a letter written by Mrs. Marian Bonsall Davis, who was for six months a volunteer worker in France, among those noncombatants who are almost hourly in

danger from German guns and bombs: "Because so many bombs fall on the town of Nancy, and because the place is sometimes bombarded, the children all know that on a certain signal they must run into the cellar of the nearest house marked with the great red cross. There, perhaps, they will have protec-

"There are children in the hospitals, victims of the bombs. There is one little girl, both legs taken off by a German bomb, hugging tight her dolly,

O'CONNOR, RED CROSS CHASER OF CYCLONES

The world is full of rainbow chasers, but the one and only official cyclone chaser is John J. O'Connor, director of the central division of the American Red Cross, with headquarters at Chicago. The Red Cross Magazine has graphically told how he personally administered relief at Newcastle and New Albany, Ind., when those cities were wrecked by storms. But it is not generally known that, beginning with the disaster at Mattoon and Charleston, where 99 lives were lost, Mr. O'Connor directed relief work in 55 communities scattered over seven states! Not only did he get calls for help from several of the nine states then in his division, but Washington ordered him to take over the cyclone relief work in Kansas and Oklahoma, which ordinarily are administered from Denver.



FOOD AND WAR

Shortage in Raw Materials Gives Rise to Alarm Among Manufacturing In-terests—America Must Apply Every Resource to Meet World's Demand for Food-Labor Saving Machines and Man Power on the Farms Vital Factors in Economic Crisis-Appeal for Government Action.

"We are now confronted by shortages around our courts and know the seamed an uneven one, and the of raw material and factory labor that in many vital lines next year. Stocks hand in important kinds of tools and machines are smaller than in noril years, because of earlier scarcity of factory labor and a rapidly tightening searcity of all raw materials.

"Farmers have deferred during the last three years the replacing of old and badly worn tools and machines. Now, confronted by the practical certainty that the war is to continue inlefinitely, with attendant assurance of shortage of farm labor, they cannot put off longer replacements of worn out machines and the additions to equipment necessary to increase acreage

and production. It is also essential in meeting the demand of the farmers for implements that there shall be preference in transportation for raw materials to the factories and for finished goods from the factories to the farms.

"For the last ten years farm labor crease in the demand for labor in mualtions factories, and the withdrawal of many young men from productive shortage of farm labor such as this country has never known. In Kansas alone a vast number of fertile acres on which the wheat crop failed will lie dle this summer, chiefly for lack of labor and partly through lack of machines to replant to corn.

"We regard it as vital to keep on the farms the men now there who know business, especially the men trained in the use of inber-saving machinery. It would be wasteful and foolish to let them go and afterward try to replace them with unskilled men.

"We seek no advantage for our industry over any other, but we realize and we want the public to realize that without this product and without sufficient labor the farmers of the United States cannot increase or even maintain their production of foodstuffs next year. To avert the calamity that such a condition will surely produce, our industry and the farming industry which it chiefly supports must be put upon the same preferred basis as the making of war munitions, even if other less vital industries suffer thereby for ma-

"These are the measures that we declare to be vital to the feeding of this nation and its aiffes next year:

"1. That the manufacture of farm materials be given equal preference with the manufacture of war munitions as regards supplies of necessary raw materials.

"2. That service to the country in farm machinery factories be considered of equal importance with service in munition making plants, Government or private.

"3. That labor on the farms be considered as of equal importance with the production of war munitions.

"4. That the raw materials for farming machinery and the finished goods be given equal preference by the transportation agencies of the country with munitions of war.

"These measures must be taken immediately to be effective, because the use and demand for farming machinery are seasonal. We must have right now materials and the men to make the farm machinery that the farmer at home and abroad must use this Fall and next Spring. Delay in action be as disastrous as failure to act
