COMMUNITY SURVEYS TO DETERMINE DIRECTION OF R. C. PEACE ACTIVITIES

"K NOW your community" surveys are in progress in forty towns and counties in Ohio, Indiana and Kentucky, in a systematic attempt to determine which community problem needs first attention. These surveys are directed in the town or county by the Red Cross Chapter. Under its peace time program the Red Cross is authorizing its Home Service sections to extend relief activities to cover the after-the-war needs of the community which were brought to light in the work of the Home Service sections for soldiers' and sailors' families.

The findings of the survey committee in each community will determine the particular field into which the Home Service will extend its activities. Six Red Cross Chapters in Ohio, Indiana and Kentucky have already chosen their lines of extension and have been authorized by the Civilian Relief department at the Lake Division headquarters in Cleveland to go ahead with the work. These chapters are at Dayton, Springfield and Marietta in Ohio, Foster and Hammond in Indiana, and La Grange, Kentucky. Recreation facilities for the county, child welfare and relief work, and aid and counsel to be given to all families as it has been given to families of soldiers and sailors are some of the lines of future work chosen.

In authorizing the extension of Home Service activities the Red Cross is taking great care that its work will not overlap that of any already existing agency. So little has been done for community betterment in many rural districts that there are many practically untouched fields. The mission of the Red Cross is to supplement rather than to supplant other agencies at work.

WAR-TIME AGENCY FINDS WORK INCREASED WITH PEACE-TIME PROBLEMS

AT LEAST one war organization has found that demand upon it has increased since the signing of the armistice. The last monthly report received at the Lake Division headquarters of the American Red Cross at Cleveland shows that 40,709 families in Ohio, Indiana and Kentucky have been given aid and counsel during the month. Financial aid has amounted to \$68,746 in that time—an increase of over \$2,603 over the previous month. At present there are 30,000 men and women in the United States giving full or part time to Home Service work. There are 357 organized bands of workers in the three states—103 in Ohio, 106 in Indiana and 148 in Kentucky.

BUREAU

Nashville, Tenn.—That Japan will moderate her rule in Korea is the prediction of Dr. S. T. Hager, recently returned missionary of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. Dr. Hager has spent more than a quarter of a century in Japan doing religious work. Japan is learning that her success in giving good government to Korea is fraught with difficulties and that tolerance and good will must take the place of harsh and severe methods. "The military leaders aim mainly at making their rule thorough and permanent, and naturally there is great temptation to the man of the sword to make his rule severe."

"But democratic ideas are growing in Japan, and more temperate treatment of the subject race will come about." Dr. Hager says the Christian missionaries in the Orient are elated at the success of the Centenary movement, through which the church raised \$25,000,000 for missionary work in all lands. Millions of this will be spent in the Orient. Hundreds of new missionaries will be sent and there will be a great advance movement in medical work, education and evangelism.

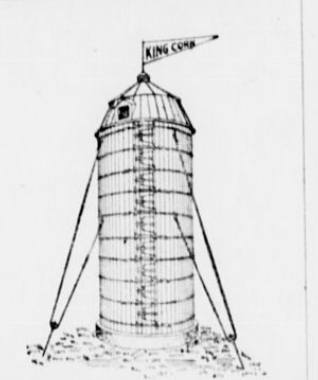

Twenty-five persons who made subscriptions will be divided into lists of twenty-five and the lists will be placed in charge of a certain member of the church cabinet who will collect all pledges as they come due.

One feature of the standard plan is that the local church will be responsible for collecting the full amount of its subscription. If any subscriber dies or meets with misfortune such as to render it impossible for him to pay his pledge, it will be the duty of the church cabinet to secure another person to take the place of the one thus become delinquent.

It is also proposed that every new member who comes into the church shall also be asked to make a contribution to the Centenary fund.

The Centenary fund of \$25,000,000 will be used for the church in an extension of its missionary work throughout the world. Several million will be spent in the devastated regions of France, Belgium, Poland and Russia. Other millions will go to the seven foreign fields occupied by the church—Mexico, Brazil, Cuba, Africa, China, Japan and Korea. Other millions will be spent in the industrial sections of the great cities, in the mountains, among the immigrants, the stragglers and the Indians, and in building churches in the missionary territory of the United States.
