

Spraying Furnishes Means of Relieving Cow For the Time and Saves Temper of Milker.

The irritation of cows caused by files not only lessens the milk produced, but, due to the restlessness of

efficient milking. The fly spray furnishes a means of relieving the cow for a time at least and of saving the temper of the milkers. The following fly repellant mixture is recommended

Four and one-half quarts of coal tar whale oil, 1% quarts of oil of tar and 1/2 ounce of oil of pennyroyal. Dissolve 3 pounds of laundry soap in water, add the ingredients of the spray and bring the whole up to 30 gallons with lukewarm water.

This quantity will spray 40 cows twice a day for 10 days. The spray should be applied in the morning after milking and in the afternoon when the cows are in the barn for sliage or


